
COMMODORE'S REPORT APRIL 2014

By the way, discussions are underway to offer a new Intermediate Membership product targeting families and young mariners with sliding scale dues. This will be discussed with the membership at a Commodore Saturday morning talk. Please join me on April 19th and have breakfast at the same time.

Microphone interference has become an ongoing, serious, and embarrassing club issue due to two new TV stations in the immediate vicinity of the club, causing disruptive feedback and interference. The next steps are to file a formal complaint with the FCC and consult with an acoustical engineer for an immediate remedy. We apologize for the irritating noise.

The QCYC electrical replacement project is underway with Maple Crest Electrical contractors, who assure us the lake level is irrelevant to the 90 day project. You will notice that they are laying conduit via kayak, and when the lake level rises they will go under with wetsuits. Heavy equipment is expected to impact parking and "U" mooring. Your patience is appreciated. New pedestals are also in process. Again, thank you to John Alving and team for your time, energy and effort on behalf of QCYC upgrade.

The Docks Committee: permits have been obtained through Sea and Shore, with yearly piling maintenance planned for fall when the lake is lower and the electrical work completed.

The AAC is pressing on toward re-carpeting our clubhouse with a June target. Many of the east coast mills have backlogs due to the Arctic Vortex this winter. Presentations for color options will be discussed at our next meeting, plus Breakfast with the Bridge on April 19, 2014, is scheduled.

In conclusion, Laurean and I have acquired a new vessel to replace Bayliner 3888 *Par-a-gon*, stolen and destroyed in September, 2013. R.I.P. Our new boat is a Bayliner 4388. We figured that if *Par-a-gon* could bash 17 other boats, impale dock 2, take 4 buck shots and not sink...well go figure. Our new boat is currently named *Odyssey*, which is a fine name but not OUR name. We knew the name needed to reflect our stressful replacement journey. Hence Endurance came to be, which means the ability to withstand hardship. One thing that has been demonstrated to us during this journey has been your friendship and help in getting us to this point. You have endured this path with us and the 17 other members/boat owners who endured damage and loss with us. Thank you!

Endurance came to us from the Portland Yacht Club. On February 27th V/C Dick McGrew, P/C Don Wilson, my son Jason and I went to the Portland YC and outfitted *Endurance* for her voyage to Queen City. The next morning we opened the boat house door to find fog, left at 0817 and down the Columbia River we went. By 0930 we were in bright sun, no wind and 60 degrees. We stopped at Astoria at 1630 for fuel and at 1700 we set out to cross the Columbia River Bar. NO wind No breakers and a beautiful sunset. The wind picked up from the east

The committee will contact those mooring members that need a current measurement and will arrange a mutually convenient place and time to measure the member's boat. Every effort will be made to make compliance with

this new rule as effortless as possible for the mooring members. Please contact our hard working Moorage Chairman, Captain Jeff Madera, with questions and concerns.

The new rule, as approved by the Board of Trustees on 10 March, 2014:

"3.06.02. Permanent Moorage Measurement. The Moorage Committee shall ensure that all boats assigned permanent moorage shall be measured by the Fleet Measurer and have such measurement on file with the Club."

DOCKS DOIN'S

PROFESSIONAL GOLFER IN **OCYC MARINA?**

It wouldn't be impossible to overhear some discussion that might sound like we have a professional golfer mooring in our marina. Any reference to tiger wood (rather than Woods) actually refers to the spiffy new species we are using in certain locations where we are replacing cleats. Anybody strolling down Dock One will see some examples where we have replaced badly rotted "treated" planks with tiger wood wherever there are cleats.

On Saturday, March 8, about 15 members turned out for Docks Fun Day. Among the projects we completed was replacing some very loose cleats and badly rotted planks on a finger pier. In exposed locations, our treated dock planks seem to be lasting about 10 years before requiring replacement. Our dock crews have planking down to a science, and can replace an astonishing number of rotting planks on a single Saturday. We run into difficulties where cleats are installed. Removing and reinstalling cleats turns a 1-hour plank replacement into a half day's job.

Wood experts assure us that we can expect about 2 ½ to 3 times the service from tiger wood, compared to the Chemonite treated decking we use elsewhere on the dock. That's good, because the tiger wood is noticeably more expensive than Chemonite. We will ultimately save money, as we can be fairly certain that the Chemonite lumber replaced 10 years or so from now will probably then sell for more than the current cost of tiger wood.

The edge planks are instrumental in shielding the dock framing from moisture, and they get a lot of stress as boats work against cleats. Upgrading to tiger wood will preclude probably two plank replacements, as well as enable our current and future planking crews to keep up with other locations where rot is occurring.

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INTERMEDIATE MEMBERSHIP PROPOSAL

he Bridge, Planning and Finance and your Board of Trustees have discussed the concept of an Intermediate Membership class for several years. Last fall we began to formulate actual proposals. As you can imagine there were many different ideas. The one constant was that everyone agreed that the club should look at methods to attract younger members. Some of the major reasons for this proposal are:

- Encourages younger people to join Queen City Yacht Club
- Stanches the loss of children of current members to other clubs
- Provides privileges they would not have if they remain non-members
- Creates an affordable means of membership at an age when money may be tight
- Provides an economical means to full membership

At the February Board meeting agreement was reached on an outline of an Intermediate Membership class. Our By-Law Chairman, P/C Scott Grimm, is developing the final language from the agreed outline. I have been asked to present this in outline form in order to get your input and comments. The following is a general outline of a new Intermediate Membership class.

- Create a new class of members called "Intermediate" for applicants either single or married less than 40 years of age. If married both members must be less than 40.
- There will be four (4) subgroups based on age for purposes of initiation and dues.
- ★ Initiation will be a onetime charge of:
 - a. Ages 21 through 25 \$250
 - b. Ages 26 through 30 \$500
 - c. Ages 31 through 35 \$1,000
 - d. Ages 36 through 39 \$2,000

- ★ Dues will be based on the following table and increase as a member advances in age.
 - a. Ages 21 through 25 \$150
 - b. Ages 26 through 30 \$300
 - c. Ages 31 through 35 \$450
 - d. Ages 36 through 39 \$600
 - Intermediate members will have all rights and privileges of membership except the following:
 - ★ Right to vote
 - ★ Right to hold elective office
 - ★ Right to serve on the Nominating Committee
 - ★ Right to permanent moorage except as otherwise provided by rule.
 - An Intermediate member may convert to Active status after 3 years by request and payment of full dues.
 - Intermediate members do not count against the Active membership limit of 400.
 - The number of Intermediate members is limited to 100.
 - A married couple less than 40 may join as separate Intermediate members.
 - A person less than 40 may join as an Active member by paying full Active initiation and dues.

I hope you will give this proposal serious consideration. In developing this proposal we have researched several local yacht clubs which offer similar opportunities. We hope that a new generation of members will bring energy to the club and develop into the leaders of the future. GEORGE J. STOSS JR.

1941 - 2014

Captain George Stoss, member #099, crossed the bar for the last time on January 15, 2014, at UCLA Medical Center at the age of 72. He was born May 13, 1941, in Seattle and grew up in North Seattle and graduated from Shoreline High School. His parents, Mary and George J. Stoss Sr, had two children: George and his sister, the late Marilyn Barby.

He was a, tenacious and driven entrepreneur who succeeded in all business endeavors. What he built and accomplished was truly his pride and joy. Captain Stoss started his business career, as with many stories, with nothing! George was the founder and CEO of Conveyor Engineering Company, G.J. Stoss and Associates and Ensalco. The Conveyor Engineering company designed and manufactured top quality stainless screw conveyors and mixers, the G.J. Stoss and Associates was a wholesale rubber products manufacturer and Ensalco (http://www.ensalco.com/) supplies complete lines of conveyor belts, roller systems, replacement conveyor equipment and material handling equipment.

George had a tremendous love of boating. He spent most of his free time on the water throughout Puget Sound, The San Juan Islands and Canada. He participated in the Tollycraft rendezvous for many years. One of his favorite destinations was Roche Harbor. He was a member of The Seattle Yacht Club and Queen City Yacht Club. In his later years, he enjoyed spending time at his La Quinta, California residence. While in La Quinta he developed a passion for the Opera and was a member of The Palm Springs Opera Guild.

George joined QCYC in 1981 and over the years made very generous donations to Queen City. George donated the first flat screen TV for our Winslow outstation and when it was determined that the screen was too small, George donated the large screen TV that is still in use. He also made generous donations to various club projects and was a bond buyer when we remodeled the club in 1998-1999.

He owned five boats while a member of our club; the *Cruiser LaRue*, a 22' Chris Craft he owned with Jerry Zuvich, the *II Zoom*, a 24' Sea Ray also owned with Jerry Zuvich, then the first of his boats named *EZ Roller*, a 27' Sea Ray, then came the *Sugar Shack*, a 37' Tolly, and his last boat, also named *EZ Roller*, a late model 40' Tolly. Interestingly, on the 40' Tolly, George had the hull extended under the swim step to improve the speed and efficiency of the boat. He had this boat hauled every year to repaint and change zincs – whether needed or not. He kept his boats in perfect condition.

George was a compassionate and generous man who was always there to support his family. He will be missed immensely. He is survived by his daughter Dana Hanssen, her husband Brody, and his grandchildren Demi and Stoss. His brother-in law, Wolfgang Barby and beloved friends Victoria Weatherford and Rebecca Jones also survive him.

Memorial Services were held at Holyrood Cemetery, Shoreline on February 7th.

CARL PREUSSER

1952 - 2014

Captain Carl Frederick Preusser slipped his moorage for the last time, going home to the Lord on February 5, 2014, after a sixteen-month battle with colon cancer. He was sixty-one years old. Born May 13, 1952, in Seattle, Carl was the youngest of four children (older brother Pete, and older sisters Penny and Judith).

A graduate of the Highline public schools, he attended the University of Washington, where he

graduated with a BS in Mechanical Engineering, like his father and brother, and was selected for a competitive internship with the Continental Can Company. He went on to work in the HVAC industry, and later became an employee of the Boeing Company. In 1997 both Carl and Joanie completed their Masters of Science degrees from Antioch University Seattle.

Carl met the love of his life, Joan Lang, in April (continued)

of 1982, and they were married in May of 1983. Carl and Joanie (and a procession of beloved, pampered cats) enjoyed many adventures grounded in Carl's natural ability as an outdoorsman.

Carl was a Certified Professional Engineer. He was a real stickler for detail in his design work. He would work out all design details to the n'th degree. When contractors worked on one of his project designs, they used his design drawings as shop drawings and then as as-built drawings with few modifications. His converter station design is a great example of his work. It became the standard for how to design and build steam to hot water converter stations in all recent converter station upgrade projects at the Boeing Developmental Center. After retiring from Boeing, Carl went to work for Spirax-Sarco, got additional training, and became 1 of 200 Registered Steam Engineers in the nation.

As detailed and precise as Carl was in his work, he was very forgiving and tolerant in his attitudes about life in general. He was well liked, always getting along with everyone. Needless bureaucracy was not his forte, however. He did his best to work through it when required, but sometimes it just needed a slight grumble or two! Starting with his first stint at Boeing in the Plant Engineering department back in the 80's, continuing through his years in environmental engineering, his time consulting with in Aerospace and Engineering, and then back a full circle to working again in the Boeing Developmental Plant Engineering group as a contract engineer. Carl was always someone you could talk to and get an intelligent perspective. Quiet, fair-minded, and highly intellectual, Carl's serious demeanor masked the intense passion he had for the things he loved: the outdoors, his wife, and his Lord.

In the non-sailing months, Carl and Joanie often went skiing, an activity Carl had enjoyed since his youth. Carl enjoyed teaching family and friends how to cross-country ski. Joanie and Carl also traveled the globe, visiting Roratonga (Cook Islands), the British Virgin Islands, Costa Rica, Australia, New Zealand, Hawaii, and spent many weekends in their condo on Lake Chelan.

Carl joined Queen City in 1987 and he and Joanie were active members. They were chairmen for several sailors' group dinners and did a Friday Night Social steak fry. Carl was a Docks Committee volunteer and a member of yard work parties. He and Joanie were faithful Friday Lunch attenders and spent a lot of time at our Winslow outstation. An accomplished sailor, Carl inherited a 28-foot wooden

ketch, the *Otter*, from his father, Hank, which he lovingly restored and maintained. After 26 years of voyages on the *Otter*, Carl and Joanie donated her to the Center for Wooden Boats and acquired *Vamonos*, a 37 foot Tartan, which they sailed throughout Puget Sound, the San Juans, and to Desolation Sound in Canada.

Joanie has very fond memories of the QCYC sailor's cruise in 1990 to Barkley Sound. A group of about ten Queen City sailboats including cruise leader Jerry Sabel, Joe Benyon, Ed and Anneliese Stoinsky, Dick and Beverly Watt, the Bill Packards, Erwin and Conyetta Gunn, Pat and Muriel Henry and the Pruessers on Otter took off from Victoria BC. On the way to the first overnight anchorage in Port Renfrew they encountered 12' swells which was an experience they all remembered. The Gunns, with their 40' heavy steel hull *Puffin*, decided their boat didn't handle ocean swells well enough to continue. The rest of the group carried on to Barkley Sound, landing in Bamfield the second afternoon. The following days they enjoyed that superb sound, anchoring in little inlets sometimes just big enough for 2 – 3 boats. After checking out as much as they could, including of course, Ucluelet, the group returned to Victoria and dispersed.

Cerebral and highly logical, Carl was initially a religious skeptic; however, as he witnessed God acting through his wife's kindness and faith over their thirty years of marriage, he came to understand spiritual love in a way no Sunday-school textbook was ever able to convey. The rock of his marriage to Joanie gave Carl a way to explore faith and what his own spiritual gift might be: the power to write his testimony for others who have "outsmarted" themselves from Christianity, to bear witness to the conversion of a religious skeptic to a Godly man. Christ's love filled him, creating a barrier to his heart and mind that cancer could not touch. Even as his illness progressed, his faith did not waiver.

On the evening of February 5, Carl passed from the arms of his beloved Joanie into the arms of the Lord, as peacefully and prayerfully as he lived. Chaplain's Note: I have to believe that an excerpt from one of our favorite poems used in memorial services is very applicable to Carl: "God prepared a harbor before Carl in the homeland of eternity. God anointed the waves with oil and Carl's ship rides calmly. Surely, sunlight and starlight shall favor Carl on the voyage he took, and he will rest in the port of God forever."

HARLAN DEAN

1928 - 2014

Captain Harlan Barclay Dean peacefully slipped his moorage for the last time on January 27, 2014, at the age of 85 at Vista Cove Memory Care Center in Rancho Mirage, California. Born on February 13, 1928, Harlan spent the majority of his life in Seattle, where he graduated from Franklin High School and the University of Washington.

Harlan married the love of his life, Jackie, in Seattle on July 11th, 1953. They celebrated 60 years of marriage last July. The Deans lived many years in Laurelhurst and later purchased a home in Bermuda Dunes, CA, for winters. They had four children; Donna, Mary K, Lisa and Rob.

When his dad died in 1958, Harlan took over the family business, Barclay Dean Inc., a purveyor of high end office furniture and related equipment. Harlan remained ever attentive towards his employees and passionate about the company's growth.

Harlan was a member of Theta Chi, Washington Athletic Club, the WAC 101 Club, Rotary, both Seattle Yacht Club and Queen City Yacht Club and served as a board member for Junior Achievement. He was instrumental in supporting the move to the new MOHAI location on Lake Union. He was an avid skier, zealous boater, creative businessman and above all a lover of people.

Harlan joined Queen City in 1978 and served on our Board of Trustees from 2001 through 2003 providing the club with sound financial and business advice gleaned from his many years of managing Barclay Dean.

For many years, Harlan provided his boat for "Old Timers Night," held annually in June. He was an enthusiastic supporter of our club remodeling project in 1998 – 1999 and was a generous bond buyer. Several years ago he very graciously donated his bond to the club. Harlan donated several dock carts to the club and trying to recognize Harlan's gift, our commodore at the time had placards attached to the carts stating that Harlan had donated them. Harlan, however, wanted the donation to be anonymous and asked that the placards be removed!

The Deans were good friends with club members Ed and Joanne Hedges even though they were friendly competitors in the office furniture business. The Hedges remember Harlan as an "extremely honest and fair competitor." The two couples toured the Far East together in 1994, visiting Hong Kong, Singapore and Thailand.


Harlan and Jackie were very close friends with P/C Doug and Barbara O'Brien and cruised many summers together, often going up to the Desolation Sound area. The Deans owned three boats while members of Queen City; the *Fairsea*, a 40' tri-cabin Chris Craft, the *Legend*, a 50' Hatteras and a beautiful 1990 57' Angel also named *Legend*.

Harlan was preceded in death by his beloved wife Jackie just a couple of months before he passed away. Harlan lived a highly principled life: when he passed, his family found a note in his wallet titled "Harlan's Code" – it read:

- 1) Be a better person each day
- 2) Keep a positive attitude
- 3) Be more understanding
- 4) Help four people each month."

What a great template for honorable living! He is survived by his children; Donna Egge (Steve), Mary K., Lisa, Rob and grandchildren; Ryan, Ross, Rebecca, Philip (Amber) Brittany, Brooke, Thomas and great-grandson Jameson.
