+ COMMODORE'S + **COMMENTS**

he budget process dominated the end of October and early November. The Planning and Finance Committee very ably led by Chairman Bob Gunderson worked with me to draft this year's budget and look into the crystal ball and

predict income and expenses for the 5 and 20 year time span. This proposal was presented to the Board of Trustees at the meeting on November 7th. Chairman, P/C Jeff Ewell, and the rest of the board after some lively discussion approved the budget for the 2006/2007 year. I'm sure if you've been keeping up with current events you will know that a lot of the discussion surrounded the 520 project which is literally looming over our heads. This will have a great impact on our club no matter which plan is adopted and the Board along with the 520 Committee are working to make sure we plan for how to deal with these impacts. Since it looks like under any plan we will lose some if not all of Dock 3 for the construction period, approximately 4 years, we are exploring alternate moorage for our members. Although the state will have to compensate us in some way, that will take a while and in the mean time we need to have funds to make our case. With this in mind the

Board approved a moorage rate increase of 15% effective January 1st 2007. This will create a little over \$53,000 this year (3 quarters) and around \$70,000 in coming years, which will be earmarked for 520 mitigation.

The board also approved hiring a consultant to review the expected life of our main station facilities such as roof replacement, HVAC equipment, parking lot repaving and others so we can make sure we have the money when the time comes. With all the major projects that are ongoing, like the piling cap project, the fire vents project and the anticipated projects for the future the board approved asking the membership to vote later in the year to increase the dues \$100 from \$550 to \$650 effective October 2007. We will be giving more detailed information about this at upcoming general meetings and in the Bilge Pump. You are also welcome to attend the board meetings on the 1st

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Monday of the month and let us know your thoughts.

I would like to thank all the members of the PFC and BOT for their time and effort to insure a bright future for Queen City Yacht Club. On a last note regarding the BOT, a vacancy has been created by the resignation of Captain Dave Richdale. We appreciate Dave's service to the club and wish him well. The Nominating Committee led by P/C Scott Grimm will be presenting their recommendation for the remainder of Captain Richdale's term at the November 22nd meeting with the vote scheduled for the following meeting on December 13th.

Captains Randy Jones and Peter Anderson made a very generous donation of all new wine glasses to the club and Club Manager Jess Hill will be putting them into service soon. Thanks

We are putting the final touches on the new annual and thanks to the tireless effort of Tarette Secretary Kathy Fish all of the member information has been reviewed and corrected.

Enough of the business side of the club and on to the most important aspect of a yacht club, having fun and boating. The Fleet Captains survived their 1st event, the Halloween Cruise and Costume Party to the Winslow outstation. What a great way to kickoff the year. By the time you read this they will have also lead the club north to Kingston Cove YC for the joint Apple Cup Party. Thanks to our good friends at KCYC for hosting the event. First, the Moorage Committee has clarified what is meant within the Club rules by the term 'reapply' when declining or failing to timely respond to an offer of moorage. Please see Chairman Bruce Ramon's article in this issue. Second, the Moorage Committee in conjunction with Kyle Bixby and the web-team, have streamlined the moorage lists management system and will now publish one updated list per month. In conjunction with the Moorage Committee, I am looking at a variety of moorage compliance issues, including outdated vessel registrations and registrations that do not conform to the rules. If you do not have a valid Washington State vessel registration, expect to hear from us soon.

Docks. Waterfront Construction will be returning within a few weeks, to resume the process of repairing and replacing pier pile caps and other related work. Our Docks Committee needs your help. There are plenty of projects both large and small that you can come do, help us save money and meet some of your fellow members.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

At the November Meeting of the QCYC Board of Trustees, the new 2006-2007 Budget was passed. At the recommendation of the Planning and Finance and SR 520

Committee's, this budget included funding for the "520 Defense Fund". As a result and after much discussion, it was decided to:

- 1. Raise the Moorage rates 15% effective January 1st, 2007.
- 2. Recommend to the membership a raise in dues from \$550 per year to \$650 per year effective October 1, 2007.
- 3. Keep the Initiation Fee the same at \$3000.

The raise in moorage rates is a Board Decision and does not need membership approval. However in explanation, this raise is due to the anticipated costs associated with the SR 520 Bridge construction project and the possibly of loosing Dock 3 for up to four years(or permanently). QCYC needs to create a fund for near term expenses while continuing to work with the city and state to mitigate the potential loss of dock 3 income, displaced boats and alternative moorage, property problems during construction, and planning for any salvage or replacement of Dock 3 at end of the 520 bridge construction.

The recommended raise in dues to \$650 per year will be discussed with the members over the next few months with a vote in the late spring. The dues have not been raised in five years and the "cost of doing business" has risen during this period. However, the main reason for the increase is that looking at our future 5 and 20 year capital expenditures, we see the planned dedicated funds set aside for these projects going to zero in the out years. We are currently not putting aside enough money to fund future planned capital requirements.

To help present a more realistic 5 and 20 year capital expenditure plan

to the members, an outside firm has been hired to look at our facilities and make recommendations on the status and useful life of our yacht club. The Planning and Finance Committee will then take this information and present to the Board and members a comprehensive estimate of our financial requirements in the "out years". This will be available before we call for a vote of the membership.

DOCKS REPORT

Your club's major asset and your most valuable facility as a member of this organization needs you. The docks here are always a major resource and are a demanding property. The docks committee is dedicated to the proposition that the good care and maintenance of such important property, is clearly the most efficient means for our members to continue to enjoy, use, and share ownership of these docks.

Dave Svendsen, as co-chairman of the operations part of this committee, needs several teams dedicated to particular portions of the work needed here. There's too much for any one or two persons to manage without this becoming a full time proposition. Arthur Mauldin as co-chairman of planning and documentation intends to aim this committee into a long and fruitful future. It has needed better organization and more automatic function to make certain the continuing needs of the marina are addressed. It has also needed a much wider overview of its needs.

Captain Tom Youngs has conducted a long project to get our failing downspouts replaced. It was long overdue, as the leaks have contributed to decay of wooden structures. The point is that he has lead a necessary job on these docks and we now have addressed a serious concern. There are a lot of needs here that can be best led by someone focused on one or two areas of concern. We need teams willing to do these tasks and people willing to learn that they can lead such efforts themselves. Not all the tasks are anywhere near as large as the downspouts, and not every one is smaller. There's something here fitting most every member of the club.

We've seen wonderful work here recently in the design, manufacture and installation of mooring struts for our three work floats. The functionality and quality of work are impressive. This project was accomplished entirely by member brain and brawn. Our savings are substantial and a few members deserve our real gratitude. Thanks to George Austin, who manufactured the struts, and Captains Bob Svendsen who designed them, Steve Hansen, Rick Sweezey, John Alving, and Tom Youngs who all worked hard to install them.

Sample lighting is being installed on the dock #1 and the committee would very much appreciate your comments. Thanks to Chairman Dave and Andy Gerde for this one. Waterfront Construction will return for another phase of piling-cap and piling replacement and repairs. We hope to see them sometime late in November and the chairman will do his best to again manage boat movements to permit the work. Your cooperation is so appreciated. It can be a very frustrating juggle.

Project lists and sign up sheets will be appearing somewhere in the clubhouse in the very near future. Please look them over and check your calendar and see if you can't offer some time for the welfare of your property. The committee intends to migrate much of its communications onto the web site, as soon as the club's web server is able to support what is in the plans.

MOORAGE COMMITTEE REPORT


The holidays are here and the Moorage Committee is happy to report the end of the season shuffle has concluded. That being said, the coming season is just around the corner.

The protocols of the Moorage Committee are what we are familiar with in recent years, with some adaptation for the benefit of the Members & Committee. The notification process is by e-mail to the top five, or more, eligible for assignment. The Committee no longer recognizes specific requests to be bypassed until a specific dock, or slip is available. If the Member desires the Committee to assign a slip, or move, the Committee desires the Member to be proactive in that process. The assignment is made to the Member accepting the slip with the lowest member number. When a Member responds by e-mail either accepting the assignment, or responds declining the assignment, but wishes to remain on the list, the member must tell us in that e-mail, and then will be restored to the list. If a Member fails to respond, or fails to request being maintained on the the list. This eliminates the need to re-apply online each time an offering is declined. The Member assigned the slip, and any others not responsive to the Committee will be removed from the lists in accordance with the rules published in the Club Roster.

The application process online has been updated to include the Fleet Measurers dimensions for qualifying length, length over all, beam & height. It also specifies the date measured and the Measurer. These are now required fields for the Moorage Application to process. The Fleet Measurer will provide the Office and the Member with the results of the measurement process, as specified in the roster. The Moorage Committee will receive that information in the form of an application to the Moorage move/ wait lists. Co-Chairman Captain Richard Frisch has stepped up to the task of updating the lists in the Excel Program for us. These lists will be printed and distributed the first of each month.

The database on the Website is being refined to be able to eliminate the monthly list system. The two systems will be in simultaneous operation until such time as we find the most Member friendly system.

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BERNT O. SATRE 1921 - 2006

Captain Bernt Satre crossed the bar on October 25, 2006 at the age of 85. Bernt was born August 13, 1921 in Sykkylven Norway and was one of three children. Bernt grew up in a turbulent time in Europe including the Nazi occupation of Norway. Not long after the war, Bernt moved to Sweden where he earned one of his four degrees, this one in Electrical Engineering.

After graduation, Bernt immigrated to the United States in 1949 and became a US citizen in 1955. After arriving in the US, Bernt went to work for the Boeing Airplane Company working on some of the earliest computers and systems. Bernt soon found his true professional calling, working for the Sons of Norway Insurance for over 30 years. Bernt was also one of the founding members of the Leif Erickson Hall in Ballard.

Bernt married Florence Johnson in late 50s and in few years they had a daughter, Lisa Marie who became the apple of Bernt's eye for his entire remaining life. In 1985, Lisa married her true love, Dave Steffan. While Bernt was skeptical of sharing his daughter, all became fine with the births of his two grandchildren Alek and Denae. Bernt was always the consummate grandfather, providing for, and loving them all unconditionally - with time even Dave!

Bernt's successful career allowed him the luxury of pursing his true loves in life: making music, travel, boating and his family. Bernt was an outstanding musician and his love of music was evident in his vast collection of instruments as well as his participation in groups such as the Likaringa and the Norwegian Male Chorus. Bernt and his friends spent many late nights singing, dancing with their wives and lady friends and enjoying the moment. Wherever Bernt went, music and smiles were always close by. He never went far without his guitar. Whether on the water of Puget Sound, a harbor in the San Juan's, or at his Lake Roesiger retreat, music, fun and frivolity filled the air!

Bernt was an avid traveler. He loved to holiday in Europe and throughout United States. He made many trips back to Norway and was especially proud of taking his daughter, grandchildren and son-in-law on a couple occasions. During his retirement years, Bernt loved to take his motor home or spend time at his vacation home in Arizona. He was active in the Pacesetters, as with everything he did, enjoying life to the fullest.

Captain Satre joined Queen City in 1987 and immediately became involved, serving as Meeting Night Entertainment chairman in 1988 and as President's Day Weekend chairman in 1994 and 1995. Bernt was a great recruiter for QCYC and participated in many, many social

events and weekend cruises. Coming from Norway, boating and the love of the sea were in his blood. He was an outstanding boat pilot and shared this love and expertise with anyone who wished to get on the water. Bernt flew our burgee proudly. Bernt was an experienced cruiser and over the years owned a multitude of boats in all shapes and sizes. While a member of Queen City, he owned two boats a 41' sedan trawler named "Fjord Song" and for the past 17 years has owned the beautiful "Fjord Song II", a 52' President, well known in the club and purchased to meet Bernt's exacting standards and requirements.

Everyone who met Bernt Satre has fond memories of him. Anywhere you went with Bernt, you were certain to meet someone he knew and somehow touched. Bernt was a dedicated servant who worked on behalf of his clients. He lived by the credo that hard work was essential for success, but true success was found in the enjoyment of life experienced with family and friends. We will miss him greatly.



Many people have asked me for this recipe, which was in Cookies Corner during the holidays last year. So, here it is. If you're having a holiday party or you've been invited to a pot luck, this recipe will come in very handy! It looks great if you use a fish mold, but it's just as good served in a casserole dish as a spread. And, this can easily be made in just a few minutes the day before the party. Any kind of crab will do; frozen, fresh, or even canned. All you have to do is take the mousse out of the refrigerator, unmold it, surround with crackers, and try to be modest as your guests rave about your skill in the kitchen!

Crabmeat Mousse

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin ½ cup cold water
1-8 oz package cream cheese
1 can cream of celery soup
2 tbls Worcestershire sauce

1 cup mayonnaise 1½ cups crab meat ¼ cup finely minced onion ¼ cup finely diced celery ¼ tsp salt ¼ tsp cayenne pepper

Sprinkle gelatin over cold water in a medium saucepan. Let stand 1 minute. Cook over low heat, stirring until gelatin dissolves. Cube cream cheese and add to gelatin. Add soup and Worcestershire sauce, cook over low heat stirring until cream cheese melts and mixture is smooth. Remove from heat, stir in mayonnaise and the rest of ingredients. Pour into a lightly oiled 5 cup mold.

Cover and chill until firm. Serve with crackers. Tip: to easily unmold the mousse, place the mold upside down on the serving platter. Dip a dish towel in hot water, wring it out and place over the mold. In just a few seconds the mold will release.


