DOCKS COMMITTEE


Waterfront Construction is here replacing some seriously degraded wood. We ask everyone to use a little extra caution around the docks where planking might be loose, some obstacles may be present, or lines and cords might be out of place. It's expected that work will continue through at least the first week of March. All three docks are scheduled for additional work, so you are not immune. Please check your tie-ups after work has been done in your area.

The next phase of roofing removal and replacement happens to the first roof unit on dock #2 during the week of either March 30, or April 6. The scaffolding will be set up near the crane as it was last summer and we will repeat the whole project you witnessed then. The project will involve the displacement of all boats moored in slips #209 through #220. The Docks Committee will be in touch with you about alternative moorage. Let us know if you have special needs, but understand that insurance issues prohibit this work unless all boats are removed. We ask that you watch carefully for hazards on the pier during this work, too. Two roof units on dock #1 are scheduled for the same treatment come July or early August.

Work parties are now a scheduled activity here. Figure on a work party on the second Saturday of every month, commencing with a short meeting and opportunity for breakfast by Willie at 8:30am. Lunch will be furnished by the committee and will be Willie's standard fare. The committee really needs people to take ownership of a vast array of different projects. Pressing needs include planking replacements, replacement of draft stops (they are a secret that I'll reveal to those who are interested and equipped with hammers) safety ladder replacements and repairs, fire hose and cabinet issues, fire extinguisher additions and relocations and plenty more.

QUEEN CITY JUNIOR YACHT CLUB

The Queen City Junior Yacht Club is now looking for eager young people for the 2009 summer boating and sailing camps. Campers must be able to swim and should be between the ages of 8 and 17. The 2009 sessions will begin the week of June 22 and run through the week of August 10. Each will be one week long, Mondays through Fridays, from 9:00am to 3:00pm.

Instruction for both beginning and intermediate level boaters is provided by certified sailing instructors. Curriculum includes boating safety, small boat handling, rowing and sailing fundamentals, knots, and more. The fleet consists

of 8 sailboats and 4 kayaks. The primary focus is to have students learn about boating and sailing while having a really good time. The objective is to have the initial boating experience be a fun one.

QCJYC provides course materials and the use of lifejackets. Students need to bring their own lunches and towels. Tuition is \$275 per week with a discount for the same student taking a second week or for a second student in the same family. Registration information is available on the Queen City website.

Last year we had 47 campers attend. Financially the program was positive with donations of \$7,760, camp revenue of \$12,025 and

We have approximately 14 shifts requiring a minimum of two bartenders per shift or a total of 28 bartenders and possibly more, needed over the five day event. It would really help us out if we could get a few more members signed up to become bartenders.

Rather than schedule a class for a specific date and time that everyone interested, may not be able to attend, I have decided to simply send people to separate classes at a time and location of their choosing. Every month I get a schedule of classes. The cost of a class is \$40.00. You will be issued your license upon completion. Get a receipt and the QCYC bar will reimburse you for the \$40.00. We will break you in gradually with an experienced bartender and will ask you to bartend as much or as little as you wish.




