#### VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT

attended a recent Moorage Committee meeting and a couple of items were brought up.

We need some work on clarifying the rules on in-station summer sublets, included under Rule 3.10, to include: when do you have to apply, when should slips be made available, best use rules, etc. These will be discussed by the Moorage Committee and presented to the Board for approval, Get your input to Richard Frisch (pyrocity@aol.com). We're trying to help keep this fair to all members.

Inactive Boats, Rule 3.08.05: boy what a subject! We're going to work towards getting those boats, where we don't see the captain or the boat cruising or at events, back into cruising shape and involved with the club. A start on this will be to ask that the boat be clean. We had an open house where prospective members made comments about boats that look like storage boats because they were dirty. Is this you? This will take expanding the club rules, so make your feelings heard about this. See Richard's email above.

Our Fire Code compliance project includes moving boats that are not more than seven feet tall, from waterline to top of cabin (Art Mauldin has a copy of the Seattle Code) into the fire breaks. We have moved some already but don't feel picked on if yours has to be moved. The sooner we comply with this the less chance the Fire Department has to find other items for us to work on. We're not avoiding these projects, just trying not to have to get them all done at the same time.

#### **DOCKS**

We have contracted with Waterfront Construction to complete the draft curtains (these are plywood walls under the covered roofs to help direct any smoke/fire away from adjacent boats and out the roof. They will work in conjunction with the roof

#### Gig Harbor YC



Bill Anderson on The Tillie was eleventh with 1.9743%. There were 17 boats racing. Dick, Dave, Bob and Jeff and Bill combined to win the best team score!

#### Eagle Harbor Race - April 4, 2008

Seattle Yacht Club joined with Queen City for the 10th year to cosponsor the Eagle Harbor Invitational Race on the weekend of April 9, 10 and 11 at our Winslow outstation. Every member of the QCYC race team and other QCYC members pitched in and with the help and financial support of the SYC race team we put on a tremendous weekend of boating. We hosted 21 boats from 6 clubs. The combination of SYC and QCYC has made this a premier event of the IPBA season and one of the largest events at our out-station.

The clear weather from an early spring high produced the typical 20 to 25 knot northerly winds and 3 to 4 foot seas to make a challenging race to say the least with nearly all the boats experiencing a rough ride. #### **DOCKS COMMITTEE**

April's work party was abbreviated due to its conflict with "Breakfast with the Bridge." Several of us met for a short time to look over the tasks we'd like to complete during April 24's "Pride of Queen City." We're looking forward to a large turnout for P of QC and hope we can manage it well, as the time for this event is shorter than usual. Please be on time at 9:00 and the work session ends at noon.

All of the ramblin' and yackin' about draft curtains has led toward a change in plans. This large scale project will be done sooner rather than later. A deal has been struck with Waterfront Construction that will relieve the club of an enormous requirement for labor and for

project management. We could have been in this massive project for two or three years by some estimates, and a good part of our treasured volunteerism might have been sacrificed to this alone. With some time and a lot of consideration and thought, a large portion of the leadership and membership have drifted toward the same conclusion. A contract is now set that should have the entire job done some time in June. Someone said we're getting too old to spend full days on ladders. I don't buy it. I know we'd fall off before that!

We need your help. This contract allows extra charges for removal or movement of obstacles, stored objects, steps and ladders or anything that gets in the way. This is our chance to clean up the docks for real. Rule 2.09 will be adhered to with new diligence. The Docks Committee does not have the manpower nor the time to cleanup the overheads and finger piers in the short time available. The committee will be busy removing and altering obstacles that are parts of the systems in advance of this job. You are asked to please remove anything stored overhead and to remove steps and obstacles on your finger piers where scaffolding and ladders will be placed. I shall defend against those charges if needed, but only if I can make an honest defense. Your stuff will make the difference. Inuse boarding ladders alone might stay in place, so long as they are not fastened and are very easily moved.



The May work party happens on the 8th and may be behind us by the time you read this. There's another one June 12 and July 10. Docks Committee meetings are scheduled for May 25 and June 22. Work parties are on the second Saturday of the month at 8:30 AM, meetings on the 4th Tuesday at 6:00 PM.

The need for assistant chairmen really is critical. We are due for another session of under docks inspection and the best time of the year to conduct it is between August and October. This chairman is unavailable. We need to get on with planning that function right away. If you've been involved, please attend the June committee meeting.

It's also time to renew the Dock Captains program. That concept needs more structure and more life. It still won't be a hard or demanding job, but more functional. Current captains, please continue if you can.





# In Memoriam

Marr, Irvine

1907 - 2010

Captain Irv Marr crossed the bar on January 26, 2010, at the age of 103 years old! When Irv was born, his father operated a tent and awning company in Lowell, MA. At the age of nine months, his parents chose to "go west" to join friends who had settled in what is now Bellevue. His father took up carpentering, and they bought a ranch on Bellevue's main thoroughfare (now Bellevue Way) where later, the Safeway Store stood for many years.

Irv attended both Bellevue and Garfield High Schools and graduated from Bellevue HS in 1926. Irv served as president of the student body, manager of the school paper, and was on the debate team. He was the center on the basketball team, and had the tenor lead in two school operettas.

At the age of 17, by exaggerating his age, he joined the National Guard as

a buck private. He took pride in the fact that, in four years time, he had earned his lieutenant's bars.

Piggly Wiggly stores play an important role in the history of the Marr family. In January, 1928, Irv got his first job at a Piggly Wiggly store. He began by mopping floors, but by applying himself, in three weeks time he was given the position of third man in a three-man store, checking. Soon, he was transferred to the second position. Irv worked for a Piggly Wiggly store managed by John Appleton, who would later become his brother-inlaw. One day John's sister Frannie, a cute 15 year-old with a fetching curly bob, came to the store to deliver lunch to her brother and Irv was smitten. Five years later in the back of the Piggly Wiggly, he asked her to marry him and they decided to elope. They married on September 1, 1932. First daughter, Ann, was born in June of the following year. Son Peter was born in 1937 and Ginny was born in 1940. Ginny is now Ginny Miller, wife of QCYC member Don Miller.

Irv had, by then become the manager of the old Safeway Store on NE 65<sup>th</sup> and 32<sup>nd</sup> in Seattle. In 1935, he decided to try the insurance business and went to work for Aetna Life, drawing \$70 a month as his beginning salary.

Duty called in 1941 when Irv was called to spend a year at Camp Murray, part of Fort Lewis. The government had formed a new unit at Fort Lewis, called the "641st Tank Destroyer Battalion." At this time he attained the rank of Major and became the executive officer, second in command of the battalion. After a year, Irv flew to Ft. Dix, joining 5000 troops, and 332 nurses aboard the S. S. Santa Paula, sailing through the Panama Canal and taking 44 days to reach their destination in Australia. Little did the Marr family realize that they would not see their husband and father for close to four years.

His first assignment was at Camp Puckapanol, where the troops lived in tents in the jungle about 60 miles west of Melbourne. When his commanding officer had a serious car mishap, Irv became the commanding officer, overseeing training for several months.

About the time he was due to move north, one of the colonels questioned Irv's hearing, and sent him to the 205<sup>th</sup> general hospital in Brisbane. The Army discovered that Irv was deaf in his right ear, and that an abscess was starting to affect the hearing in his left ear. He was then stationed in Cairns with a Lt. Colonel rank and served in Cairns as commanding officer for about two years, closing the port detachment at Iron Range, including two airstrips and a hospital. Upon returning to the States, Irv went directly to Camp Ethan Allen, TX, the tank destroyer center, and was put into the hospital for a month of hearing tests.

Irv and Fran wasted no time in creating two new "baby boomers," David, born in 1946, and Debbie fourteen months later. The family moved into their present home in 1947. In June of 1955, Irv and Fran's last child, Susie, arrived; a perfect gift whom they always called "their little dividend."

Irv resumed his career as a supervisor working for Paul Green at Aetna, becoming an Associate General Agent and, after some time forming his own agency, Marr and Associates casualty business.

Irv, who was always looking for a way to fill a niche or provide a

service when he saw a need, created his hospital television business in 1959, providing TV services and equipment to hospitals throughout the northwest. Irv took great pride in the fact that his son David took over the business.

Captain Marr's faith and his attendance at Sand Point Church were central to his life. He attended his first board meeting in February, 1947. He served as chairman of the finance committee and the board, was instrumental in building drives, and hired the architect for the new addition, supporting the church generously with his gifts of time and resources over the years.


First and foremost, Irv loved his family and he provided for them one and all in whatever ways he could; individually, collectively, and generously. Irv had a strong work ethic, was an energetic worker, and always had projects to keep him busy. Although Irv had never expressed much interest in travel, Frannie encouraged him to go to Hawaii and they both lost their hearts to the Islands. Soon they were enjoying the Holy Land, Great Britain, and other adventures abroad.

Irv loved boating and joined QCYC in 1969. The Marrs owned two boats: the 32' Seashell and the 'S Marr-Velous, a 38' Chris Craft in which the family plied the waters of Puget Sound, the San Juans, and the Canadian Gulf Islands for decades, reveling in the beauty of the islands. Irv loved to crab and the family liked to think that he considered himself "The Crab King!" One crab pot full of crab was never enough! Frannie and Irv were introduced to "RV-ing" somewhat later in their lives, but

quickly caught the wanderlust and loved their travels on dry land as well.


When Irv was getting close to turning 100 years old, he contacted the Seattle Times to ask for help in finding some of the veterans that he had served with. Nicole Brodeur, Times columnist, was so taken with the graciousness of Irv that she spent quite a bit of time with Irv until he died at 103 years. Her article about Irv that appeared January 28th of this year was a tribute to this very honorable man.

Frannie passed away in 2002, shortly before their 70<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary. He is survived by his son, David (Jan), and daughters Ann Ott (Charles), Virginia Miller (Don), Deborah Ederer (Bob), and Susan Bordner, (Tom), 17 grandchildren, 26 greatgrandchildren, and his sister, Priscilla Reems.
