
FLEET CAPTAIN'S REPORT Summertime, and the Cruising is Easy

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Long Cruise August 15-29

Our long cruise is designed so you can drop in or do the whole thing. The dates are August 15 (a Sunday) to August 29. The cruise will actually end August 27 in Olympia, leaving you two days to get back at your leisure. Or not.

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE GRAND 14

I have been asked by the Editor to prepare a short history of the Grand 14 for the membership. The following has been excerpted from the Blue Book of the Grand XIV Yacht Clubs of Puget Sound 2009-2010. Anyone with additional information is requested to contact me with further details.

The clubs of the Grand 14 have been working and playing together since 1949 when the Grand 14 became official. The Grand 14 consists of the following yacht clubs: Bremerton, Day Island, Edmonds, Everett, Gig Harbor, Meydenbauer Bay, Olympia, Port Orchard, Poulsbo, Queen City, Rainier, Seattle, Tacoma and Tyee. While this is a closed group, it still has a primary goal to work with all the other Puget Sound yacht clubs to further our common boating interests. The Grand 14 also supports the Recreational Boating Association of Washington (RBAW) to promote not just yacht clubs but boating in general.

The Commodores, Vice Commodores, and Rear Commodores of the above yacht clubs meet at various functions throughout the year. The Commodores attend 14 Commodore's Balls during their Commodore year. These are formal affairs and provide an opportunity for each club to honor their Commodore and First Mate.

Every other year, each of the 14 clubs has a Junior Officers' Ball in recognition of its Vice and Rear Commodores, and invites as guests the Vice and Rears of the other 13 clubs. The host clubs are rotated so that there are seven J.O. Balls per year. In addition to the J.O. Ball, which is traditionally a themed costume party, the junior officers meet for a breakfast business

meeting the following Sunday. Ideas, problems/solutions, and upcoming events are discussed. These provide a valuable opportunity to draw from others' experiences.

In addition to the Commodores' Balls and Junior Officers' Balls, the Grand 14 officers attend several other activities and support their fellow clubs' activities. In August of each year the newly elected Rear Commodores meet each other and "bond" with counterparts from the other Grand 14 yacht clubs. In January, all the Grand 14 officers meet at our outstation in Winslow for a social week-end and "Commodore Roast."

While the exchange of ideas and information is of enormous value to each club and its officers, the long-term benefit of making new friends, friends which will last long after your days as a Bridge officer, is what makes the Grand 14 experience such a wonderful one.

DOCKS COMMITTEE

The May work party was postponed one week to help with the draft curtains preparation work. Most of the out-of-service dry standpipes on dock 1 & 2 were removed on the weekend of May 15. We're going to be amazed at how many tons of scrap iron were removed by club labor. The Dock 1 telephone mainline was

relocated to dock level from the overhead to completely clear out the open air space at some of the fire breaks. Improved cleat mountings were tested on Dock 3 and we'll be securing the rest of the cleats on the south side of the dock in the near term. Some planking was replaced on dock 2 and a few other small tasks were completed, all by 16 persons on Saturday, of which 7 returned for more incredibly hard work on Sunday.

The remarkable amount of work done is due to efforts by: Iim McFadden, Dan Lohse, Chuck Gould, Bob Maruska, P/C Daryl Anhalt, Dave Svendsen, Don Frizzel, V/C George Austin, Art Mauldin and Allan Bender. The truly amazing two day wonder workers were Gary Nelson, Nadeane & Tim Rutledge, Dick Dow, Bob Prestabak, Ron Stevenson, and Mitch Garton. Special thanks go to Dick Dow and Ron Stevenson for planning, organizing, shopping and otherwise making this critical project happen. If you weren't working hard, you were in the way of this crew! The Docks Chairman is very grateful not to have had much leadership role in this work.

By the time you read this, much of the new draft curtains will have been installed and we will be even closer to completing our required modifications to comply with the fire code adopted into law by city ordinance in 2005. QCYC is far ahead of the curve on this mandatory work and we all should be proud of the accomplishment. We get safer here as we progress and our property exists at declining risk. Those who will fight any fires here confirm that the standpipes are their first choice as a critical tool here and they are very pleased to see in place such a time saving system as ours.

Mooring members, as well as those visiting, are reminded of Queen City Rule #2.06, Electrical Connections. "No electrical connection from a boat shall be made to the dock electrical system except by an approved 30 ampere, 3 prong plug and receptacle and grounded cable with at least a 30 ampere rating." Non-complying members will be informed and may be disconnected should hazards be indicated. Please note also that mounting cords and other wires with metallic devices such as steel clamps, nails, or screws are prohibited practice by the National Electric Code. Nylon one-screw clamps and other devices are made for securing electrical wire and cable. understanding of the issue might help sway your attention to this matter. Metal in contact with thermoplastic or rubber insulation presents some chafe hazard but the important concern is that heat from any fire will rapidly be conducted to the wire insulation and it will promptly melt through, causing additional sources of ignition to light more fires. Also metallic objects including pipes may become energized and dangerous to anyone present at the scene. Wires of any sort are not permitted to come into contact with fire standpipes especially.

The next Docks Committee meeting is scheduled for June 22, the fourth Tuesday of the month. Time is 6:00 PM. Find us in the conference room or on level 2 of the clubhouse. The next work parties happen on the second Saturday of the month, June 12 and July 10. We meet at 8:30 AM on the second deck and try to get work started by 9:15. Lunch is on the club and we try to wrap it up by about 3:00 or 3:30 PM.

In Memoriam

Lynn Olason

1920-2010

Captain Lynn Olason died peacefully on April 21, 2010, at 89 years old, about three weeks from turning ninety. Lynn was born on May 29, 1920, as Mathusalem Lynn Olason on a homestead outside of Hensel, North Dakota. His mother was an immigrant from Iceland and his father also was of Icelandic heritage. Lynn and his twin brother Lloyd, joined brother Ray and later welcomed brother Willis and sister Lois. His parents moved the family to Ballard in 1935 to get a good education for their four boys, all of whom ended up working at Boeing. Lynn graduated from Ballard High School in 1939, but not before he met the love of his life. Marcella Wee. The Olason family lived near the Frodesen family in Ballard and Lynn and John carpooled to high school and then to UW Engineering school together where Lynn earned a degree in Aeronautical Engineering. It was at the UW when Lynn met Joe Sutter, commonly known now as the "Father of the 747." They would become friends and colleagues at Boeing for over 40 years.

Lynn and Marcella were married on January 16th, 1943. After graduation in 1943, he served in the Army Air Corps and was stationed at Wright Field in Dayton, Ohio, performing high-speed flow aerodynamics research. While still in Dayton, their eldest son Dan was born in 1944. After the War, Lynn and Marcella moved back to Seattle and in 1946 he and his twin brother Lloyd, with help from their father Gutti, worked together building Lynn's and Lloyd's homes. In 1947 Lynn and Marcella moved into that Ballard home on 28th and 93rd that they would share for over 63 years! Their second son Bill was born in 1946 and daughter Barbara in 1951.

In 1946, Lynn began a long and rewarding career at the Boeing Company, where he would stay until his retirement in 1984. While there, he made notable and lasting marks on the evolution of the commercial airplane as Director of Product Development, Chief of Aerodynamics for all commercial airplanes and later as Vice President and General Manager of the 747 Division. His work spanned a broad spectrum ranging from the certification of the Boeing Stratocruiser, the last propellerdriven airliner, to elongating the upper deck of the 747 to its presentday configuration. He was involved in the conception of the 707, 727 and 737, and flew on the first flight of the 747, which is parked at the Museum of Flight today. He also worked on performance certification of the 727 and 737. He is one of the patent holders on the 737-300 for his engine/wing integration analysis. He and his team flattened the bottom of the engine nacelle so that it would clear the ground. He worked on the configuration and airline requirements for the 747 during its early stages of development, and then was instrumental in the design of the 767 cross-section.

He was a Fellow of the AIAA. In 2007, the UW College of Engineering named Lynn as one of a group of Diamond Award honorees to recognize the significant achievements of eight UW Engineering alumni who led the development of the passenger jet at The Boeing Company. As such, he was honored and recognized with the "Distinguished Group Achievement - Pioneers of the Passenger Jet" award. He was also honored as the "2003 UW

Department of Engineering Alumnus of the Year."

Lynn loved to have a good time. He enjoyed traveling the globe with Marcella as a benefit of his work for Boeing. Lynn and Marcella were quite the dancers and enjoyed countless nights waltzing together. He was an avid boater and also shared a love of boating with Lloyd and his family. In 1954, they launched the 34' *Ebb Tide*, their first boat, which the brothers had built.

Captain Olason joined Queen City in 1960 and soon became an active member making many friends that socialized and cruised together. In 1969, Lynn and Marcella replaced the Ebb Tide with the Mar Lyn, a 37-foot Chris Craft. In 1973, Lynn's twin brother Lloyd joined the club and in 1976, both of his sons, Dan and Bill, joined the club and in 1986 daughter Barbara's husband, Chris Aaro, joined making Queen City a family affair for the Olason family! In 1986, Lynn & Marcella launched the Mar Lyn II, a beautiful 48-foot Ocean Alexander he designed and had built in Taiwan and on which they cruised for 18 years (the boat is still at OCYC on Dock One, now named the Frode).

Lynn chaired the Kid's Easter Party in 1974, 1975, 1979 and 1980. In his last years here, he spent much of his time resting and being visited by his family. He also returned to the faith of his childhood. He once remarked about his faith in God, "Aren't you glad we're forgiven?" Profound, yet so simple. Although Alzheimer's took its inevitable toll, Lynn was so very blessed to live such a long and rich life. More importantly, he knew it, and never took it for granted. Whether it was unbending nails to be used again or carving his own shoe orthotics out of wood, Lynn was always keenly aware of what a blessed life he lived and was determined not to waste any of it. Not one family member, Boeing colleague, or fellow club member could remember Lynn ever getting mad, irritated or cranky - in fact, they all remembered Lynn always with a grin on his face and a quick and humorous wit that would relax a tense situation and get people laughing and working together. Those of us that had the privilege of knowing him certainly are the better for it. He was an extraordinary man whose humor, infectious smile and humble heart were one-of-a-kind and will truly be missed.

The greatest joy in Lynn's life was his family. He was preceded in death by his eldest son Dan, as well as his twin brother Lloyd, both Queen City members, and older brother Ray. Lynn leaves behind his wife of 67 years, Marcella, his son Bill (Sheila), daughter Barbara (Chris), daughterin- law Carol, eight grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren, his sister Lois and brother Willis.

Richard K. Fish 1922 - 2010

Richard (Dick) Kenneth Fish passed away January 11, 2010, at the age of 87. Dick was born in Seattle on December 8, 1922. He was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Kathleen. Dick grew up in Seattle and graduated in 1942 from Ballard High School.

Following his 1944 graduation from the US Maritime Service Officers School in Alameda, California, Dick served as an engineer aboard ships in the Pacific War Zone. Upon his return from military service, he married Kathleen Gordon in 1948. He was hired by and spent his career at Westinghouse Corp. After completing the Westinghouse training program in Peoria, IL, Dick & Kathleen made their home in Ballard, then Shoreline. Captain Fish's career as a steam service engineer for Westinghouse sent him worldwide to install, repair and service steam turbines in ships and industrial plants. He worked aboard Navy ships, Coast Guard cutters, and the Navy aircraft carriers USS Kitty Hawk and USS Constellation. He loved to share stories about being flown out to sea to board ships in need of emergency servicing. Landing on and taking off from the flight deck was always described as "really something."

Dick & Kathleen started their family with the birth of Pamela in 1949. Then the Fish family was expanded by the birth of Mike in 1953. Mike and Kathy are now members here at Queen City

Dick joined Queen City in 1961 and was soon a very active member. He served in many capacities and in 1968 became club Secretary. In 1971 he became our Fleet Captain and was

the Chairman of the House Committee in 1969 and 1974. Dick owned two boats while a member, a 30' Tollycraft and a 45' Chris, both named the Flying Fish. Dick had a passion for the sea as was evident by his many summers of cruising the waters of Puget Sound and Canada aboard his Flying Fishes. In the mid 60s, the Fish family was named "Boating Family of the Year." The Fish family cruised often with the Lynn & Marcella Olason family, the Howard and Donita Wilson family, the John and Marianne Frodesen family, the John and Toni Kennedy family, the Earle and Pat Roberts family and the Gordon and Joanne Henrikson family. These couples and families would often rendezvous in the Gulf Islands and Desolation Sound area. A favorite destination was Scott Point Marina in Long Harbour of Saltspring Island. Dick is remembered fondly by his QCYC contemporaries as a loyal member and good friend. He was a great mechanic and often fixed not only his boat but also his cruising partners' boats if repairs were necessary. He loved the water and the escape he felt it afforded him.

In addition to being an active member of QCYC, he was also proud of his Masonic affiliation as a 32nd Degree Mason and was a member of the Nile Temple Shrine.

At Dick's request and in accordance with maritime tradition, Dick's ashes will be scattered at sea during an 8-Bell ceremony signifying the end of his "watch" here on earth. Dick is survived by his daughter, Pamela Fish Kahle of Bend Oregon, and his son, Michael K. Fish (Kathryn) of Brier, WA. He was the proud grandfather of 5 grandchildren. 

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


