This is a reminder from Capt Art Mauldin on cold weather protection of our vessels. Check electrical shore power plug-ins by unplugging both ends and checking them for signs of overheating and then clean them. It is recommended that you do this monthly. Check your fenders for proper height and mooring lines for wear and proper tension. Use only approved heaters on the inside of your vessel. Make sure hose bibs are drained and not connected to the water supply.

As I write this month's article on Veteran's Day, I'm reminded of the sacrifice that families have made in the past and offer our gratitude and honor for those sacrifices. And, to all our military veterans we express our special honor and appreciation for your service and love of country, for without your service we would be living in vastly different world today. Thank you.

DOCKS:

At the general meeting the past Wednesday a member had great questions, so I'm sure others may be asking as well. I'll do my best to be brief:

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February 1st thru February 28th July 15th thru September 15th

"Why must boats be relocated to comply with Fire Code?"

"Why do we need fire vents?" In 2007, the QCYC marina was found to be in violation of City of Seattle Fire Code Chapter 94 and thus mandated by The Seattle Fire Department to come into compliance by 2014. The following 7 year plan was approved by SFD.

- Year 1: Conceptual planning
- Year 2: New fire extinguisher placement Signage Emergency plan Transmittal of emergency (phones)
- Year 3: New standpipe system
- Year 4: Draft curtains
- Year 5: All fire breaks gain compliance (7 foot rule)*
- Year 6: 50% of covered moorage smoke vents
- Year 7: 50% of covered moorage smoke vents

Years 1-5 are now complete as planned and have been SFD approved

Finally, for the next 2 years the plan is for each covered moorage slip to be fitted with a ventilation skylight constructed to melt & pop up at 165 F, thus

* The 7 foot rule: In fire break slips the distance from the water to the top of the vessel's superstructure shall not be over 7 feet. Thus the reason many sailboats occupy those slips.



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preventing a horizontal spread of fire. Sincere thanks to all members with displaced and moved vessels and our moorage committee chair for outstanding cooperation!

DOCK ONE EXPANSION **UPDATE: STATUS** PENDING

We have applied for a permit for the extension of Dock 1. Adding 4 58-foot slips, 3 44-foot slips and 1 64-foot slip as approved by QCYC Board. This will be a long and slow process.

REGATTA POWER REPORT

OCYC SKIPPER OF THE YEAR

As is the case in nearly every year, the club's Skipper of the Year was determined by the outcome of the Flag Officers' Race. The 2012 QCYC Skipper of the Year was won by Bob Lindal and P/C Jeff Ewell. P/C Dick Timmerman was second. Dave Padgett was third, P/C Dean Lentgis was fourth and Ken Klett and Mary Elbon were fifth.

FLAG OFFICERS' RACE

The race was held on a partly sunny October weekend (October 19 to 21) with 15 kn south winds to challenge the racers.

Dave and Joanne Padgett on Slipaway won the Commodore's Plagues and first overall with a score of 0.64%. P/C Dean Lentgis on Kalos Filos took second and the Vice Commodore's Plaque at 0.74%. Ken Klett and Marv Elbon on Klettitat took third and the Rear Commodore's Plague with 1.02%. Treasurer John Rogers on Nirvana took the Secretary's Plaque and 4th overall with 1.44%. Bob and Doug Lindal on Suzy Q took the Treasurer's Plaque and 5th overall with 1.58%.

OCYC-SYC CHALLENGE RACE

After a few years when the race was not conducted, we re-started this end of year Challenge Race with SYC. The race is conducted on one boat with 2 five racer teams from each club. Though the leg distances and headings are given, the racers each calculate their predicted run times and the effect of wind and current in about 90 minutes. There are 5 legs in the AM half of the race and after a lunch break the racers are given the same info and calculate

the 5 leg PM race. The boat owner skippers the boat on the course using all aids such as radar, chartplotter, etc., and there are no throttle changes. As each leg is completed a running score of how each racer and each team is doing is announced. It can be very exciting with the lead switching back and forth as the race progresses.

The race was run on Zorro, Bill Grady of SYC's 68 ft Nordhavn, on a very windy Sunday 11/18. The winds were a steady 15 kn with gusts to 25 kn. As the wind was from the south and there was a large ebb current, there were no wind against water effects and the seas, though whitecapping, were only 2 to 3 feet. But in the passagemaker Zorro, the seas were barely felt by the participants. But the seas did create much greater than predicted ebb current in the main sound and made for some large errors.

The AM race went from Shilshole to the West Pt mid channel buoy, to Meadow Pt to the mid channel buoy off Jeff Head, then to Pt Monroe, Indianola and Port Madison. The PM race went through Agate pass to Pt Bolin, back through to Pt Jeff, Pt Monroe and finished at Shilshole.

The strong ebb currents in the main sound decided the race

which was won by QCYC because they better judged the effect of wind and currents in the open fetch of the sound. The predicted ebb current was only 0.3 kn, OCYC used about 0.6 kn but the actual currents were nearly 1.0 knot. The QCYC team included Bill Anderson (who also won for the best individual score), Bob Lindal, Dave Padgett, Bruce Cullen and Andy Gerde. P/C Al Smith was the QCYC racemaster, who laid out the PM race. R/C Dick McGrew was the official "judge" and represented the bridge. The SYC team was Steve Hazlerig, Scott Strandjord, Todd Prodzinski, Jim Vaupell and Alex Lorenz. The SYC racemaster was Ted Schultz, who laid out the AM race. Bill Grady skippered the

The racers and their spouses enjoyed a wonderful dinner prepared by Chef Willie at QCYC and the coveted "Barrel" trophy was again awarded to QCYC (for the 9th of the last ten times it has been awarded in its 30 year history).

DOCKS COMMITTEE

Tou're in luck! If you were just thinking that you missed the December Docks Committee Meeting, it's been rescheduled to Tuesday, January 8, at 6:00 PM. It figures that no one would sacrifice their Christmas eggnog to a Docks Committee meeting on Christmas Day. I think a meeting on January 8 conflicts with other stuff, but we can be brash and contrary at times! The regular January meeting happens Tuesday, January 29, at 6:00 PM.

The work parties are scheduled for January 12, February 9 and March 9. This is the period of time when it might be cold and it might just snow, but we need to get work done.

Plan to discuss the options for an additional Saturday docks session each month so we do not lean more heavily on the people who already regularly give to the club one Saturday each month. We need some new workers and a new leader or two to act more proactively in protecting the docks from the agents of time and of Mother Nature. There is an enormous amount of lumber in the planking that makes up the decking on these docks. Sometime when I'm bored or when I'm attempting to avoid some work, I'm going to calculate how much lumber that really is. Are you aware that if a person walks all three docks back and forth and the interconnections between the docks that the person has traveled almost exactly one mile?

It's critical that we keep ahead of the fungal rot which often starts in the decking that's so exposed to the weather. Old timers here remind me that we used to "turn the planks" at times to put the bottom side up to wear and the elements. It no longer works because the nature of the lumber has changed. The differences between high density old growth douglas fir and the soft open grain woods of today are quite amazing. In the olden days, our planking wore down in grooves like the pavement on a highway. Turning the planks did a great job in getting a second life out of the planks. Today, the wood, even when treated with preservatives, tends to split and open its grain a little, letting in the fungi that rot and grow

in wood. It's Mother Nature trying to take back her Portage Bay. Personally, I think this is evidence that she's not an enthusiastic boater. The rot needs to be removed before it jumps components and attacks the structural parts of the docks and causes very expensive damage. So often we've witnessed a rotting board that's been left too long and seen

all the parts that join together in one place all fail. It's not so hard to do the planks. It's a big deal to replace support columns, dock stringers and piling caps.

We're finding that one session per month isn't getting ahead of the problem and we already know that the club gains its best financial benefit from our labor when we service our planking. We might do much bigger jobs, but then we'd not be doing the one from which we gain the most benefit. All things here are tradeoffs of limited resources. Let's build up the resources some more. It's how we've made Queen City Yacht Club survive nearly a hundred years already. We are our very QCYC best when we volunteer. In fact it's what we are.

CHRIS BENSON'S PRIZE-WINNING **BUTTERSCOTCH CREAM PIE** RECIPE






