DOCKS

Captain Art Maudlin has been taking readings of "stray" electrical current on our instation docks and found Dock 1 to have many grounding issues. We hired Larry Boyer of Boyer Engineering, a specialist in dock electrical systems, and he has found many problems with Dock 1. His full report will be in our hands by the time you read this and we will have to look into an action plan. Captain Art Mauldin has already placed a temporary ground wire on Dock 1.

Planking & bolts & cleats... oh my! Please contact Captain Chuck Gould if you can spend a few hours on the morning of the second Saturday of the month to help maintain our docks.

The fire vent project is completing the City Of Seattle permit process. We expect to begin work by the end of May or June with completion by year's end.

The Dock 1 extension project remains on hold as the board and bridge carefully examine the Muckleshoot Tribe Fishing

REGATTA POWER REPORT

The Tacoma YC Jack Hyde Memorial Race on March 23rd was held at TYC's Wollochet Bay outstation for the first time ever – or at least that anyone can recall. Again re-emphasizing that the ONLY way to be invited to the out-stations of the Grand 14 without going through the bridge chairs is to be a log racer. The cadets from Curtis High School's Naval Junior ROTC group were observers and several raced on TYC member's boats as the second racer, doing their own calculations.

Tacoma YC were again gracious hosts with a Hawaiian themed weekend: appetizers in the clubhouse on Friday night and a whole roast pig, luau style, at the Saturday night awards banquet.

The bright sunny and warm spring day with calm winds and seas contrasted with the usual swirling currents. The course ran from Fox Island to the Narrows Bridge and then around the island clockwise to Fox Island Bridge.

The scores were particularly good considering the currents predicted and observed. Seven racers bested 1% in the field of 20 Racers. Steve Hazlerig of SYC on Solara won for the second time in March with a score of 0.6388%. Second overall was POYC/GHYC's Fred Cole on *Mousetrap* with 0.6622%. Ken Klett and Mary Elbon with 0.7121% error on Klettitat were 3rd. Bob Lindal and P/C Jeff Ewell on Suzy Q were 4th overall and first in Class 3 with 0.7468%. Dave Padgett and F/C Barry Rutten on Slipaway were first in class 2 with 0.9217% and 6^{th} overall.

EAGLE HARBOR RACE – APRIL 6TH

The Eagle Harbor Invitational Race was held on the weekend of April 5, 6 and 7 at our Winslow



outstation. The QCYC race team and other QCYC members pitched in and with the help and financial support of the SYC race team we put on a tremendous weekend of boating. The combination of SYC and QCYC has made this a premier event of the IPBA season and one of the largest events at our outstation. We hosted 23 boats from 8 clubs, with several clubs attending for the first time in many years.

Our outstation was as busy as a summer holiday weekend club event with over 30 boats including other club members and the racers - and as usual we accommodated everyone comfortably. QCYC members handled most of the social events and SYC took care of most of the race functions and the Friday night dinner. Ken Klett and Marv Elbon handled Saturday Night and P/C's Dick Timmerman and Dean Lentgis and Bill Anderson prepared their usual great omelets on Sunday morning. Vince Firlotte was in charge of arranging the observers. As an extra wrinkle this year; the galley remodel was not quite finished on time so ten QCYC members went over early and cleaned up the "mess" from the construction. Kind of like camping out but fortunately not as much "camping out" as Barry and Colleen Rutten's Fleet Captain St Patrick's

Day cruise to the outstation; they didn't have cabinets or running water.

The several inches of rain accompanied by 20 knot winds sure messed up the current predictions but there were still some very good scores. The course ran from Blakely Rock through Rich Passage, back through Rich and around Blake Island.

EAGLE HARBOR RACE

First Overall went to P/C's Dean Lentgis and Larrie Chmela on *Kalos Filos* with a 500 Club score of better than 0.500 % - 0.4532%. SYC's Bill Grady and Todd Prodzinski on *Zorro* took second with a 0.6459% error – beating by less than one second – Bob Lindal and P/C Jeff Ewell on *Suzy Q* who took third with 0.6549%.

QCYC won the Team Trophy with Marv Elbon and Ken Klett and Bill Anderson and P/C Dick Timmerman joining Dean, Larrie, Bob and Jeff for the best team.

QCYC racers won lots of Class awards as well. Ken Klett and Marv Elbon were 1st in class 5 with 0.8049% and 4th overall. Bill Anderson and P/C Dick Timmerman on *The Tillie* were 3rd in Class 4 and 11th overall with 1.6310%. Dave Padgett on *Slipaway* was 14th with 1.9363%. John Rogers on *Nirvana* was 18th with 2.1779%.



FLEET CAPTAIN'S REPORT

U.S. COAST GUARD BEHIND THE SCENES TOUR

On the last Saturday of March, an intrepid band of 20 QCYC yacht club members gathered at the US Coast Guard Sector Puget Sound base for the Behind the Scenes tour. The sun was shining brightly as we began the event with a tour of the USCG Museum. Queen City's own Larry Dubia, who has been volunteering at the museum for 27 years (!!!), provided us with an outstanding and highly informative tour, chock full of fascinating history and little known tidbits about the Coast Guard, its equipment and its people. Thank you, Larry, we all learned a great deal.

Then it was off to the Vessel Traffic Service, where we were given a detailed and highly informative look at how this unit of the Coast Guard performs its vital function. It was dimly lit inside the fairly large room so that those on duty could more easily see the huge banks of multiple screens displaying charts, vessel tracks, wind and weather data, AIS data, long-range cameras and other data needed to perform the Vessel Traffic Service function. Our members had lots of questions and they answered every one, but we had to talk in hushed tones as the watch standers communicated with all manner of vessels! We were told that they encourage recreational traffic (that's you and me!) to contact them on VHF Channel 14 to ask about any traffic in the




shipping lanes that may be in conflict with your planned route. Identify your vessel, your position and intended destination and they'll do the rest. At the very least, it's an excellent idea to monitor Channel 14, to increase your situational awareness.

Next it was across the hall to the massive and very impressive Joint Harbor Operations Center. This is a Coast Guard facility that is shared with many other agencies when needed, such as the Navy, Seattle Police, Washington State Patrol, Customs & Border Protection & Homeland Security. The center is designed to identify and respond to all threats to maritime safety, port security, and the environment. The room was very modern and the entire front wall was filled with many huge video monitors. Facing these monitors were row after row of workstations, each with four or five monitors as well, which could be displayed on the front wall monitors if needed. Over 70 multiagency cameras are integrated into the sensor management system. On top of that, watch standers

have access to more than 40 different data sources. It's a very impressive place.

The JHOC is where Mayday and other VHF calls to the Coast Guard are routed and answered. They allowed us to see the new and very impressive Rescue 21 system in action. Simply put, the system upgrades the Coast Guard radio direction finding equipment and related computer software to allow the Coast Guard to locate the source of VHF calls much faster and with far greater accuracy than ever before. They use triangulated radio signal direction finding equipment to get lines of bearing to the source of the transmission. Amazingly, they only need the briefest of transmissions to locate you. One Mayday utterance is all it takes, but all three are better! They told us they highly recommend the use of the Digital Selective Calling (DSC) feature on your VHF radio and to be sure it is tied into your GPS. This allows them to pretty much take the Search out of Search & Rescue

By this time we were starving and so we enjoyed a lovely, sunny picnic lunch under a gazebo that



gave us the energy to tackle the next stop on our adventure, ship tours!! We were given guided tours of a 378 foot high endurance cutter, the USCGC Midgett and the 399 foot heavy ice breaker, the USCGC Polar Sea. We were up on the bridge of both vessels. We even helped the crew load groceries onto the Polar Sea, as they were getting ready for their first deployment in 7 (yes, seven!) years! What a blast we had on these ships. The crews were friendly, professional, very polite and they really knew their stuff.

PRE-DAFFODIL SOUTH SOUND MINI-CRUISE & DAFFODIL FESTIVAL

As this issue went to press, we were preparing to depart for the Pre-Daffodil Mini-Cruise to Blake Island and Gig Harbor and then on to the Daffodil Festival at Tacoma Yacht Club. A full report on these events will be provided in the June issue of *The Bilge Pump*.

A choice of natural teas, with slivers of lemon, tiny rose centered sugar cubes, and a small pyramid shaped tea bag for each guest to take home as a favor, made lasting impressions.

The short program included an interesting presentation on Victorian tea etiquette, including a specially filmed interview of our oldest living Tarette, Margaret Baxter, who is now a very young 101. Margaret joined the Tarettes shortly after its conception in 1943 and left the Seattle area in 1957 to live in Wenatchee, WA, now her permanent residence. Though out of the area, she still maintains her membership and reads the Tarette monthly publication, *Tattle Tale*, without fail. In fact, during the interview made in the spring of 2012, Margaret spoke fluidly and passionately about life at QCYC during the 1940's and the effects of the war on its members. What an archival treasure! Margaret was not able

to be at the tea, but her cousin, Donna Gagner, delightfully attended. Donna also brought her mother, Julia Bick, who is a long time friend of Margaret's. The President of the Tarettes presented Donna with the golden Tarette lifetime pin, which she will give personally to Margaret Baxter. In turn, Donna presented the Tarette Archival Committee with Margaret's original Tarette pin from 1943.

In closing, each Tarette past president who attended received a single English rose in recognition. Guests were slow to disperse, as many lingered with friends in appreciating the Tarette Archival Committee's evolving display of Tarette memorabilia. Using cotton gloves, now tattered pages of many annual scrapbooks reveal customary Tarette newspaper articles of long ago, the many good times captured in fading photographs, and the calligraphy-like handwriting which recorded the small but important details of past meetings and minutes. The Tarette organization realizes that it's important to revisit the past. Indeed, to honor it, to remind us of how far we've come and, based on that foundation, how far we may go in the future.

It was a very special celebration.
