## Avoid Mainstation Car Break-ins with Prevention Techniques

Lights and cameras in the mainstation parking lot didn't stop thieves from breaking into four cars on one night in June! According to police department data, Seattle recorded 8,326 car break-ins in 2022, but that likely is low since many victims often don't file a report. A conservative estimate of car thefts in Seattle rose 73% between 2019 and 2022. With fewer officers and inability to prosecute offenders, there are few consequences for open public drug use, theft including burglary and simple assaults. QCYC continues to explore ways to prevent these break-ins, but avoiding break-ins is ultimately up to you. According to Seattle Police most car break-ins and thefts are from unlocked cars. Criminals like to walk down the driveway to our parking lot to prowl vehicles in the lot. If a car is unlocked, they open the door and take whatever is visible and move on to the next target. If the car is locked, a thief can break

into your car and be out in about 30 seconds! In this case, it took less than five minutes to check out the place and less than four minutes to burgle the four cars.

QCYC again recommends:

- 1. Remove anything that a car prowler might mistake as something worth stealing, as thieves like to window shop!
- 2. Avoid leaving anything visible or worth stealing in the car. Almost any item that's visible from the outside - spare change, sunglasses, even an empty bag can prompt a break-in.

These thieves are clever and QCYC continues to seek ways to prevent these break-ins and will keep you informed of any further developments as we implement security measures that are effective while keeping your club costs low.

## What's Up with Mainstation Marina **CENTER PILINGS?**

You might discover something missing at your QCYC slip.....and in most cases members will say "Good riddance." Back when boats weren't as beamy, QCYC installed pilings in the middle of either all or most of the covered double slips. Certain skippers relied on these pilings to somewhat "bounce" their boat into position to enter the slip, but probably due to the prevalence of bow thrusters, that practice seems to be increasingly rare in more recent times.

Over the decades, these pilings did what wood will do and rotted away. A few survived. A few more were cleverly encased in a plastic sewer pipe to help extend their lives. Within the last year, several pilings failed. Members complained that pilings were "leaning" into the area needed to get into and out of a slip. We have cases where two adjacent boats occupy all but less-than-one-foot of the total available width in a slip, and giving up most of that at the entrance to the slip makes it even more challenging to get a boat into moorage without scraping.

Ron Stevenson shot some pictures recently as several of the problem pilings were sawed off at the mudline. We take this

approach rather than removing the buried portion of the piling because, as far as the environmentalists are concerned, we still \*have\* a piling in that location. If sometime in the future QCYC wants or needs to reconfigure any portion of the marina in a way that would require pilings- it's not

unusual for the authorities to insist we must remove a number of pilings equal to the number, we are going to install. Voila; we have a piling "bank" we can access in the future by pulling the stubs up out of the mud.







# RBAW Tackles Watercraft Excise Tax Inequities

The Recreation Boating Association of Washington (RBAW) continues to work closely with Department of Revenue and BST Associates to explore a plan to fix fundamental inequities in the Depreciation Schedule being used to assess boaters the 1/2 of 1 percent Watercraft Excise Tax they pay each year. BST Associates is a strategic planning group that specializes in preparing economic and financial analyses of waterfront projects. The Department of Revenue heard a series of "key concerns" with the Depreciation Schedule, chiefly that it over-inflates the value of older vessels purchased 14-15 or more years ago. Data is currently being prepared by BST Associates to develop a proposed fair market value depreciation schedule for vessels that have been owned for 15 years going out to 25 or 30 years. Work will continue during the summer months.

In other RBAW news, If you're on Lake Union this summer, please be aware of the seaplane advisory buoys and move 200ft east or west if they're flashing yellow. 

### HOLDING TANK PUMP OUTS FOR FREE AND FOR A FEE

#### Before you go out and about don't forget to pump out! Posted by Michael Day, Chuck Gould & Pete DeLaunay

FREE PUMPOUT IN THE QCYC 'U' – the yellow zone in the 'U' is reserved for those using the pumpout, and a load/ unload zone. After you use the 'U' pumpout, be sure to close the valve, or the next user may have to reprime the pump. To reprime the pump, hold the suction hose higher than the top of the structure housing the pump. Use the nearby garden hose to fill the suction hose with water and, in about 10 seconds, the pump will reprime. The suction hose is ready to be placed on the deck fitting for pump out. An amiable unattributable source said, "When very large boats come and tie up, they tend to tie up East and West, and oftentimes they extend well into the yellow zone and block access for everybody. Yesterday, there was one 40' boat in the U....tied up exactly in the yellow area. The rest of the U was empty. Nobody was aboard."

FREE pumpout facilities can be found at dozens of fresh and saltwater locations – visit (www.pumpoutwashington.org) to find a nearby pumpout station.


FREE mobile pump outs are available in Kitsap County to weekend boaters from mid-June through the end of August. Service will be available most Saturdays in select destination locations such as Poulsbo - public docks at the Port and anchorages in Liberty Bay only; Eagle Harbor - anchorages, public docks, marinas, and yacht club outstations; Blake Island State Park - public docks, buoys and anchorages; and Dyes Inlet.
