
COMMODORE'S REPORT SEPTEMBER, 2014

I have also reviewed the practice of towing cars with a couple of our Grand 14 yacht clubs. Towing may open up a spot in the lot but does not solve the basic problem which is that we do not have enough parking for everyone during these peak summer periods. Being respectful of the rules and other members' rights is really our basic responsibility. I do welcome your comments and will pass them on to my fellow bridge and board members.

I would like to finish by thanking everyone who has helped us this past year. I would also like to welcome all the new members once again and look forward to everyone's involvement with the club.




HOUSE COMMITTEE

1965 - 2014

Captain Dave Carlson crossed the bar for the last time on June 16, 2014, at the age of forty nine. Dave was born March 1, 1965, and was a true Seattleite, growing up on Capitol Hill and living here to this day. He passed away of a heart attack doing what he loved, hiking and being in the outdoors.

Dave graduated from Blanchet High School in 1983, then headed for WSU and graduated with a BA in business in 1987. While there he joined Phi Delta Theta and met Betsy, who was a member of Alpha Gamma Delta. Interestingly, although they knew each other, they didn't date while in college. Dating came after graduation, the result of her cousin, also a Phi Delt. Dave and Betsy were married in April of 1991 and had a great marriage with two daughters: Hailey, currently an Alpha Gam at the University of Washington and Rachel, a new Seattle Prep graduate heading for Gonzaga.

The Carlson family lived their early life in the Green Lake neighborhood and when the kids became school aged moved over to the Windermere neighborhood. They have stayed faithful members at St. Bridget's Catholic Church. Betsy writes: "Devoted to his three girls, he constantly set an example of how to be an amazing husband, father, son, brother, friend and Catholic." (He often referred to his beloved dog Maggie as his third girl!) Never having a bad word to say about anyone, David was the best father and husband that anyone could ask for.

After graduation, Dave started his career working in the new cell phone industry for Excellular Co., where he worked for a couple of years. He then joined his dad in the insurance business and never left it. When his dad retired, Dave purchased Carlson Insurance and managed it for twenty plus years. In 2000, Dave bought Lentgis Insurance from

Dean (when Dean was preparing to retire) and merged it into Carlson Insurance. Dean stayed to help Dave during the transition period and then, at Dave's request, decided to stay on board permanently. Dave's work ethic was constantly celebrated by his peers through various awards. He had many passions in his life that included traveling, boating, his business, being a soccer "Boyo," playing two times a week, watching ANY Cougar sport, and, most of all, spending time with his family. His positive outlook on life was infectious and resonated with all those who came in contact with him. Dave loved outdoor activities, especially with his daughters. Dave was quite a runner, having run seven marathons, two in NYC, two in Houston and three in Seattle.

Dave joined Queen City in 2008 and quickly made many friends in the club. He was a regular at Friday Lunch and his family enjoyed Winslow and the club cruises to the outstation. He and Betsy owned a 36' SeaRay and loved family cruising in the San Juan Islands, annually going up in August and finishing their cruise at Roche Harbor for a few days.

For someone who left us so young, he lived a truly full life. Betsy writes: "We were blessed to have him in our life for as long as we did." Queen City members feel the same way.

He is survived by Betsy, his loving wife of 23 years; his three girls, daughter Hailey (20), daughter Rachel (18) and "Maggie," his dog; his parents, Bill and Ruth Carlson; and sisters, Sue Campbell (Ron), Kathy Christman (Bill), Margaret Harder (Mark), Chrissy Jensen (Lance); and many loved nieces and nephews.

EXPLORES PERILS OF THE LIFEBOAT




