FAQ re: The QCYC Music Committee

A: Contact committee chair Chuck Gould (text 206-605-6744) as far in advance as possible.

Q: How is the Music Committee funded? Is there any charge for music at club events?

A: The Music Committee no longer receives any money from the QCYC budget. Members cover their own expenses, and pool their personal resources to purchase, upgrade, or repair our collectively owned sound system. QCYC provides some storage space and permission to rehearse on the third floor when not otherwise in use (both of which are highly and sincerely appreciated!) We are delighted to perform for fellow members at QCYC events without charge.

Q: How about private parties and non-QCYC events?

A: We are available to play selective private events for a nominal charge. (Often less than it would cost to hire a DJ). We have played Commodore's Balls for some non-Grand Fourteen clubs who rent QCYC's third deck for their events. Some of the private events have included parties and celebrations hosted by members but not officially a club event. Nobody on the Music Committee takes any personal money from private events. We use the money strictly to offset performance-related expenses and maintain/ upgrade our sound system.

ACTIVE CLUB MEMBER FOR 56 YEARS CROSSES THE BAR FOR THE LAST TIME

One of our well-liked old-timers, Ned Akerman, crossed the bar on May 29th of this year at age 101! Ned was member #006. Ned was born in Marengo, Iowa but his family moved around quite a bit while Ned was growing up. It was the Great Depression and times were very difficult for Ned's family as well as many in our country. It turns out that Ned was quite a Chronicler, having written a story of his life from birth to 1989 plus a chronicle of his first great seafaring adventure.

As a teenager, Ned crewed on a ketch-rigged sailboat from Honolulu to the Columbia River! Yes, Pacific storms and all! When they arrived in Warrenton, Oregon the skipper's daughter was there to meet them - Esther and Ned were eventually married. Ned and Esther had four children. What a blessing these chronicles have been to his kids, especially his son Marty who was his motorcycle buddy for many years and shared Ned's chronicles with me. Both his autobiography and his seafaring adventure are compelling

It turns out that as an adult, Ned had another seafaring "adventure"! It occurred when he and Esther were entering Sequim Bay in 1985 for a

night's anchorage when an engine fire destroyed the boat. Ned and Esther were rescued by the Coast Guard, firefighters, and a flotilla of commercial and private boats. She burned to the waterline leaving them without a penny in their pockets their wallets had been left on the boat in their haste to escape and destroyed in the fire! The local Fire Chief invited them to stay the night at his home what a kind thing to do!

Captain Akerman Joined Queen City YC in 1967 is remembered fondly by club old-timers as being

a fine gentleman, friendly and very pleasant man. He was active in the club volunteering for work parties and serving on committees such as the Bilge Pump committee, Regatta, Moorage, Nominating, Publicity Committees and was the Chair of the Old-Timers Cruise & Entertainment Night for several

He and Esther (predeceased) owned a 25' Monk designed cruiser named "Inshalla" that burned in Sequim Harbor, a '66 Fairliner also named "Inshalla" and finally a 39' Trawler with a DeFever hull also named "Inshalla".
