


The keepers of tradition in modern times. That's one way to describe P/C Dean Lengtis & Kathleen (aka Sistee). They are each dedicated to the craft of caring for members in good times and bad times.

Dean decided to join QCYC back in 1973

when, newly divorced, he said he did not want to be the dad who took his kids to movies. So, he bought a boat, with no TV on board, to be the dad who spent time with them. Dean served as Fleet Captain in 1977 and 1978 and Commodore in 1981.

This is when Dean ended up starting some of the cruise-in traditions we have at the Outstation on Bainbridge Island. He went to the membership for permission to host the Grand 14 Junior Officers for a cruise-in. This event now happens every January. When he asked for permission to also host all Past Commodores a year later, he succeeded and again this event still happens every year, the weekend before the juniors are there. That first year, he said 164 people attended. (this event now averages about 70 people)

Dean also started new member orientations. The first year, he said 9 out of 10 new members attended! He made a point that these happened back in the age before computers, and rapid communications. He had to organize and track all of it through landline phone calls what we now call 'snail mail' or good old fashioned in person

Perhaps this is why you still see Dean as a regular fixture at Saturday breakfast!

Dean also established the memorial fund for people to leave something to the Club

and not only handled insurance for years for the Club but created a committee to carry it on when he retired.

Dean was an outstanding, very decorated log racer when he started dating Sistee, so she said just jumped right in helping whoever needed her. Sistee got involved in the Tarettes and served as president. Sistee also found her calling, working with Ken Klett to plan memorials for Club members and their families.

It's much more work than people realize. Sistee and Ken meet with the family to find out what their needs are. Do they want an 8-bell, ashes spread at sea, any flowers, programs? Once they have direction and that list, they work to fulfill it all.

She dedicates substantial time to the planning process and invests many additional hours on the day of the celebration of life. "The goal is to create a place and a time that you may feel the most comfortable in going through the memorial," she said.

"The Club has been great for me," Dean said. Both agree that they get more out of their efforts than they put into it. \triangle

QCYC Board Approves Cashless Transaction Policy

t the June Board of Trustees meeting, approved Cashless Transaction Policy for the Club. This policy will take effect with the start of the new fiscal year on October 1, 2025. For most members, this change will have little to no impact. It primarily affects a small number of individuals who currently pay their quarterly statements using physical currency.

Cashless Policy

The Club has been gradually transitioning toward a cashless payment model in recent years. The bar and store have already adopted this approach, and the new policy will now extend to all other areas of payment, with a few exceptions outlined below. This move is intended to enhance security, minimize the risk of theft and fraud, and streamline overall Club operations.

Accepted Payment Methods

QCYC will accept the following non-cash payment methods:

 Automated Clearing House (ACH) bank transfers (for quarterly statement payments only)

- Personal checks or checks issued via online banking (for quarterly statement payments made to the front office only)
- Credit cards (Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover)*
- Mobile payment platforms (Apple Pay or Google Pay)*
- Debit cards

*A transaction service fee will be applied to all credit card and mobile payments made to quarterly member statements, currently 3.5%.

Exceptions:

Cash will continue to be accepted for purchases made at the soft drink dispenser and laundry facilities at the Mainstation. The Club Treasurer is permitted to authorize the acceptance of cash in writing on a case-by-case basis, based on specific events or circumstances. This policy is posted on the Club website under Regulations > Policies > Cashless Transaction Policy.

Regular Oil Maintenance Extends Engine Life

ast Commodore, Dave Krows slipped his moorage for the last time May 31, 2025, at the age of 82. Dave Krows was one of those characters that we sometimes meet in the passage of our years. He is remembered around the Club as being popular and having a quick wit, and could tell stories, jokes and anecdotes that seemed endless with a sly look in his eyes.

He joined Queen City Yacht Club in 1989 and quickly became active in the Club. Over the years, Dave served as Grounds Chair, as a member of the Moorage Committee, and was instrumental in starting, with Larrie Chmela, the Wednesday night dinners on Member), eleven grandchildren; and six meeting nights.

He served on the Board for one year before being elected to go through the Chairs. He started through the Chairs in 2000 culminating in serving as Commodore in 2003 with Margaret by his side. They represented our Club in a classy manner making many friends in the Grand 14.

The Krows owned three boats while members of the Club; a 28' Bayliner, a 32' Bayliner, and their favorite, a 45' Uniflite all named "Krows Nest"!

A longtime resident of Kenmore, WA, Dave is survived by his beloved wife of fifty years, Margaret; their children, Deanne, Lisa, Matthew, and Benjamin (a QCYC great-grandchildren. His love for family was unwavering and deeply felt by all who knew him.

He will be greatly missed by all members of OCYC.

He was born on June 25, 1942, in Seattle, Washington, and was raised in the Magnolia District. Dave graduated from Queen Anne High School in 1960. He then enlisted in the United States Air Force in June 1961. After completing basic training, he graduated from the Aircraft Hydraulic & Pneumatic School and went on to serve as a still photographer with the 363rd Tactical Reconnaissance Wing. He was recognized with several commendations for his service, including the USAF Outstanding Unit Award during the Cuban Crisis, the Air Force Good Conduct Medal, and the National Defense Service Medal.

Following his honorable discharge in 1965, Dave attended Bellevue College, where he earned a degree in Criminal Justice. He began his law enforcement career serving the cities of Medina and Clyde Hill before joining the Port of Seattle Police Department, where he dedicated twenty-six years of service until his retirement in 1999.

Dave had a lifelong passion for boating and travel. He and Margaret made many cruises, mostly on the Seabourn and Silver Seas lines. He earned his U.S. Coast Guard Merchant Marine license in 1983. Dave was a life member of the Nile Shriners A.A.O.N.M.S.

Krash the Krows Sad Turn

The Annual Krash the Krows event took a sad turn with the passing of P/C David Krows, but that didn't prevent the Fleet Captains' carrying on with a modified event.
