Good News! Flower bulbs are pushing up in the garden - spring is around the corner.





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Vice Commodore's Report **BOAT SHOW VOLUNTEERS & ANNUAL INSPECTIONS**

For Seattle area boaters, one of the first signs of spring is the great Seattle Boat Show! This year the Seattle Boat Show is held February 4th thru February 12th and is one of QCYC's best opportunities to make a positive impression with area boaters who might be interested in joining a yacht club. Thank you to all the volunteers who have signed up to work the QCYC booth. And a special thanks to Membership Chair Val Ohlstrom for all her work in organizing this event.

Most organizations have rules that their members are responsible for knowing and following. Queen City is no exception, and has rules for those members who have the privilege of mooring at QCYC docks:

3.04.02: "Every vessel moored at Queen City Yacht Club at the Mainstation on a permanent, temporary or sublet basis, every vessel assigned to winter moorage at the Bainbridge Island Outstation and every vessel applying for new permanent moorage or sublet, shall be required to pass an electrical inspection as described in this rule. The inspections will be conducted by electrical inspectors appointed by the Club.

3.04.02 e Vessels governed by this rule are subject to inspection on an annual basis, and the Committee may require additional inspections based on observed conditions."

Furthermore, Rule 3.02 Qualification for Permanent Moorage clearly states that mooring members "must have a current Washington State Department of Licensing Registration, and are insured with a current and enforceable liability insurance policy in the amount of at least \$500,000, with the Club named as an additional insured."

If you are a mooring member at QCYC Docks, it is your responsibility to schedule and pass an annual Vessel Electrical Safety Inspection and to provide a current copy each year of your Washington State Department of Licensing Registration and a current copy of your insurance policy to QCYC

Office Manager at office@queencity.org.

To check the status of your Vessel Documentation, go to queencity.org. Select 'Moorage' and then Select 'Vessel Qualifications Overview' and finally Select 'Vessel Documentation Status'. Scroll down until you find your name. If you are in 'Fail Status' that means you need to provide documentation to the QCYC Office Manager.

To check the status of your Vessel Electrical Safety Inspection, go to queencity. org. Choose 'Moorage', then choose 'Vessel Qualification Overview' and finally choose 'Vessel Electrical Inspection Status.' Scroll down the list until you find your name. If you find your status to be 'Fail' that can mean one of two things. It can simply mean it has been over one year since your last Vessel Electrical Safety Inspection or it could mean you have been tested and found to be in 'Fail' status. Either way, please schedule a Vessel Electrical Safety Inspection by going to queencity.org. Select 'Calendar'. Locate a 'Vessel Electrical Safety inspection' and complete the sign-up process. The next scheduled inspections are on February 19th and March 19th.

CUMMINGS HALL SAWSTOP HELPS PREVENT FINGER LOSS

One of the many benefits of a QCYC membership is access to our shop in Cummings Hall, located near the Dock #3 entrance.

On the other hand, that's one of the greatest risks of a membership- both to the individual members as well as potential liability to the club.

The most dangerous power tool is a table saw. Nationally, there are about 4,000 amputations by table saw every year. Losing a finger can change your life by a lot. Losing a few or losing an entire hand will change it even more.

We don't ask members to "qualify" for access to the power tools. If you've got a key cardyou have total access. For every member who really and truly knows what they're doing and has a long history of safely operating some of the power tools in our shop there is probably a member who says, "Hey, look! A table saw! How cool! I wonder how it works!"

A few years ago, we replaced a "let her rip" version of a table saw, capable of cutting almost anything (as well as anybody) with a state-of-the-art SawStop table saw. The primary design imperative of a SawStop saw is preventing the amputation of fingers. The saw generates a magnetic field immediately around the blade. If anything capable of conducting electricity (metal, wet wood, wood preserved by soaking in copper, or human tissue) comes within about a 16th of an inch

of the blade, the magnetic field collapses and a powerful "brake" fires to bring the blade to an instant stop. The brake activates as fast as a high-speed shutter on a camera.

The SawStop works as designed. From the same perspective that it wouldn't be acceptable to "almost" prevent an amputation, there's no leeway for cutting materials that are going to trigger the blade. It's tempting to think, "That doesn't apply to me, I know what I'm doing." It's tempting to think, "It's just a little bitty cut, and it's just this once." SawStop is notoriously unforgiving and doesn't brook exceptions.

The brakes are just under \$100 and only work once. Most of the time, the blade is also destroyed when the brake fires, and we try to avoid using junk blades. A few members who have triggered the brake have stepped forward to

take responsibility for doing so, but most of the time the offenders just slink off and we learn the brake has triggered when the *next* member complains that they cannot use the saw.

Yeah, it's a trade off. If we're going to have a table saw at all and if it's going to be accessible to every member regardless of competence and experience (or lack of same) we need a model that has as many built in safety precautions as possible. If a QCYC member is going to lose a finger somewhere, let's not have it be on the club's table saw. So please take seriously the limitations on the table saw. They are posted on the wall behind the saw. There's no reason to worry about forgetting them. The saw is not going to cut "your" personal piece of metal or wet wood, nor is it going to cut it "just this once." Truly, it isn't.

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






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POTATO SAUSAGE DOGS SEEK FOREVER HOMES
