Opening Day of Boating Season is finally here! Welcome to Queen City Yacht Club's biggest party of the year! Please join us for a very fun week as we share our love of boating while connecting with old friends and meeting new ones.

The theme for Opening Day 2019 is 'Boating Through the Decades'. When you arrive at Queen City, you will see the Clubhouse decorated in honor of Tall Ships. Some members may not be aware that SV Fantome, a steel-hulled sailing yacht, was a familiar sight on Portage Bay and Lake Union from 1939 until the early 1950's. SV Fantome was built for Great Britain's Duke of Westminister in 1927 and later acquired by beer baron Ernest Guinness who brought her to Seattle in 1939 where she became stranded by the outbreak of World War II. At that time, the 257- foot vessel was the world's largest private yacht and its four masts barely made it under the Aurora Bridge on the way to Lake Union. After the war, King County blocked Fantome's departure in an effort to recover back property taxes from Guinness. The vessel ended up resting at anchor in Portage Bay for nearly 14 years.

The celebration starts on Wednesday, May 1st at noon with the arrival of QCYC's Grand XIV guests on the South side of Dock 3. The schedule of events is as follows:

REAR COMMODORE'S REPORT REMINDER TO CONDUCT 'Spouse overboard' DRILL!

In April, Denise and I motored down to Tacoma Yacht Club's annual Daffodil Marine Festival. We've been ten times, or was it eleven? We obviously enjoy being around several hundred other boaters who adventure out early in the season. If you've never attended, you should consider going as it's a blast; especially when QCYC wins more HARDWARE!

After one of the event dinners, a table full of experienced boaters began discussing what they would do if their spouse fell overboard. The answers ranged from, "speed up!" to "I'd call 911" (seriously) to "I'd throw something in the water to mark where I last saw them." (seriously again). I was amazed at how few people have ever considered what they'd do if someone ever went overboard on their vessel. I asked around all weekend at Daffodil, and most had never considered practicing their plan (if they even had one).

Do YOU have one?

I have actually experienced a "spouse overboard" event. A few years ago while motoring into Brentwood Bay, BC, my First Mate tripped and fell into 50 degree water. Yes, Denise was wearing a vest and yes, we were underway (9.5 kts). I have the entire incident on a GoPro. If you're thinking, "Funniest Home Videos?" (I thought about it too!), no, the video doesn't do the incident justice. But enough about how I missed out on an opportunity to win the \$100K Funniest Home Videos Grand

Fortunately, Denise and I practiced a "spouse overboard" drill just a few months earlier. In the brief 3.5 minutes it took me to spin the boat around, and glide past her to pick her up, Denise's hands were so cold she could not use them to assist in getting out of the water (definitely early stages of hypothermia). I was able to quickly get Denise into the boat and into a warm shower and she made a full recovery that day (her pride may have taken an extra day...or two...).

Had we not practiced we certainly would have REALLY fumbled through Denise's romp in the water. But we both knew what steps (and there are many) are necessary to prepare for and to extract a person from the water. We throw a lifebuoy into the water and walk through what we'd do if that were the other person in the water (no, not "speed up?"). Even with a practiced plan, I had no expectation that Denise would not be able to assist.


Throwing that Lifesling that's been hanging off the back of your boat for the last X years is NOT a rescue plan. You should REALLY practice a plan to get someone out of the water. And that means, you must consider for the sake of practice, that the most experienced driver is in the water and unable to help you. If you are the only able bodied person on deck, what are YOU going to do to get that person onto your boat? Is your swim platform unobstructed? Can you even lift that person onto your swim platform?

Do your guests, your loved ones and yourself a logical and necessary favor: make a Man Overboard Plan and take a few minutes to REALLY practice that plan. Something so simple could make an everlasting difference.

Information about QCYC cruising destinations can be found on the QCYC website.

Bainbridge Island (aka Winslow) Outstation

Our club's main outstation is located half way in on the north shore of Eagle Harbor on Bainbridge Island. The club house features a full kitchen, restrooms, showers, laundry, cable television and WiFi. Limited vehicle parking is available next to the clubhouse. The dock is "U" shaped, with 30 amp power and potable water throughout. From May 15th to September 15th of every year, Members can tie up on either side of both fingers on a first come - first served basis. All vessels should be moored with bow to water (south) / stern to shore (north). The city of Bainbridge Island is a short walk from the OCYC outstation where you will find a grocery store, shops and numerous restaurants. www.queencity.org/bainbridge-island-wa

Dock Street Marina, Tacoma WA

The Marina is at the very southwest end of the Thea Foss Waterway in Tacoma WA. It sits on the side near the WA State History Museum. Look for the large red building, which was a train station. This is a reservation-required Outstation and Members are strongly encouraged to phone (253) 572-2524 (info@dockstreetmarina.com) as far in advance as possible. Contact the Marina by phone or on VHF 78A for slip assignment prior to arrival. There is 125 and 250 volt power, water, and cable TV on the docks, with garbage and showers nearby and slip-side pump outs available.

Deer Harbor Marina, Orcas Island, WA

The marina is located at the Southwest corner of Orcas Island, and the first commercial marina entering the harbor. The marina has coin-op showers and laundry, dockside potable water, plus WiFi and 30 amp power. There is a small convenience store on site with a deli; and access to a small swimming pool across the street. The Deer Harbor Restaurant is about a mile north of the marina and an easy walk. QCYC contracted dock space is identified by the yellow highlight bar in the picture and by the QCYC identification affixed to the west side only of that floating dock. No reservation is necessary as this is a first come - first served tie up. Rafting is allowed up to three deep. Contact info: 360-376-3037 or VHF 78A (but neither is necessary to stay at the QCYC area)

Port Browning Marina, Pender Island, BC

This is a reservation-required Outstation so members should call (250) 629-3493 & VHF as far in advance as possible. There is 15 and 30 amp power, limited water, and WiFi, with laundry and shower facilities available. Rafting may be required. Port Browning Marina has an outdoor pool, convenience store, and is within walking distance of a shopping center with groceries, a liquor store, gift shops, and a gas station. On site is also the newly renovated Bridgeman's Pub and Bistro, serving lunch and dinner.

Port Sidney Marina, Sidney, BC


Reservations are required at Port Sidney which is a full service destination with 30 and 50 amp power, water, and WiFi on the docks, with laundry and shower facilities nearby. There are many restaurants, two grocery stores, hardware

store with marine supplies, drug store and BC liquor store all within walking distance. On Thursday evenings from May to August, the impressive "Sidney Street Market" is held two blocks from the Marina on Sidney's main street. For a reservation call (250) 655-3711 (admin@ portsidney.com) as far in advance as possible, and for a slip assignment upon arrival hail the "Port Sidney Harbormaster" on VHF 66A. Contact information: 250-655-3711 or VHF 66A.

Salt Spring Marina, Ganges, BC

Ganges / Salt Spring is a full service destination within walking distance to the center of town where there are restaurants, a grocery store, a hardware store with marine supplies, a drug store and a BC Liquor store all within a few blocks of each other. On Saturdays, from April to October, there's an impressive farmer's market held in the civic park two blocks from the center of town (pets not allowed).

Reservations are required and can be made by calling 250-537-5810 or VHF 66A info@saltspringmarina.com. Hail the "Salt Spring Marina Harbormaster" on VHF 66A for a slip assignment.







QCYC EIGHT BELLS TRADITION MEMORIALS GIVE A MEMBER'S FAMILY VALUED MEMORIES

The Eight Bell Burial Service at Queen City Yacht Club



Mainstation Memorial buoy

is a sea oriented burial, following cremation, where the ashes of the deceased are placed in the waters during an appropriate ceremony (similar to a graveside service). At the end of a brief service on a Queen City Yacht Club boat, the ashes are placed in the water, family and friends place flowers over the ashes and the club bell is rung eight times followed by a moment of silence.

The name of the service goes back to the earliest maritime and naval sailing ship days when the striking of the ship's bell announced the time of day and kept track of the seamen's watch or duty shift. The ship's bell was sounded each half-hour during the sailor's normal four hour shift or watch. To identify which half-hour it was, the bell sounded once for the first half hour, twice for the second half hour, three times for an hour and a half, etc., until the four hours had passed, when the ship's bell was rung eight times. The eight bells indicated that the shift was over and the next shift would start. At Queen City Yacht Club, we have adopted and adapted this naval tradition to symbolize that one's life on this earth is over and the beginning of one's next watch in eternity has begun. Our 8-Bell Buoy replica on the patio is a red light buoy. We all know the navigation rule: "Red Right Return" or "Red to Port Outbound" --- properly symbolic of the last long voyage as the tolling of the eight bells marks the completion of one's watch here.

The concept of our 8-Bell Service was brought to Queen City Yacht Club, in approximately 1960 from Royal Vancouver Yacht Club by Charlie Anderson and Lloyd Vosper after they attended a memorial service for a friend up there. To Charlie and Lloyd, the service was reverent and proper and they felt it would provide comforting help for grieving families and friends when a club member or family member passed away. Upon their return from BC, they introduced the concept to Queen City members who enthusiastically adopted it. Since there is no grave marker for a Sea Burial, Charlie and members decided that a permanent structure should be fabricated to provide for the names of the deceased to be permanently engraved so that the deceased would have a proper marker. This plan was adopted by the members and all of the fabrication was enthusiastically planned and built by the loving hands and hearts of Queen City

Captains.

Since the early sixties many Queen City Yacht Club members have chosen this sea burial for themselves and their families. At this time, 156 names of our members and their loved ones have been inscribed on the 8-Bell buoy bronze plaques. Over the more than 50 years of weathering on the patio, our 8-Bell buoy began to show its age and wear. In 2012, Captain Al Teel, who had been our 8-Bell Committee chair for many years, passed away. He had been maintaining the bronze plaques and having the names inscribed and had come to the conclusion that our buoy needed updating and refurbishing. Al being a man of purpose and action decided that when he passed he would leave his boat, the "Eleganzia", to the club and the proceeds of the sale of the boat should be used to support the Junior Sailing Program and also used to refurbish the 8-Bell Buoy! The buoy structure has recently been sand blasted and powder coated in a brilliant Coast Guard red buoy color and new bronze plaques have been cast. Installation of the newly refurbished 8-Bell buoy took place in April 2016 just in time for our May Centennial celebration.

The 8-Bell service may be a standalone sea burial service or precede or follow a memorial service or funeral. These services are available to Queen City Captains and their immediate family members (spouse, children). There is no charge for this service as Queen City Captains graciously donate the use of their boats and our club provides use of the clubhouse for memorial services. If the family wishes to have an 8-Bell burial, the club Chaplain will assist in selecting a date, arrange for a boat and make arrangements for the family. When a memorial service is desired, the club Chaplain plans a service with the family and the Tarettes arrange and serve refreshments as provided by the family.

Members wishing this service for themselves or an immediate family member are encouraged to make their wishes known to our club Chaplain and/or to their family. Many members wishing to have an 8-Bell burial and/or a memorial service have included the request in their will.

Now get out there and boat!



Don't forget spare **PARTS**

While planning for the 2019 boating season, I was reviewing my list of onboard spare parts and supplies. As a past coastal freighter captain, and later, a shipboard inventory software sales rep for AMOS Inc., I can attest to the importance of a spare parts and repair inventory.

Many seasoned boaters may not find this information helpful, but hopefully there will be something here that everyone can use.

While there is no "crystal ball" telling you what spare parts to stock onboard, there are some obvious offenders that may fail on a regular basis. Belts, hoses, fuses, circuit breakers, light bulbs, switches, canvas snaps, clamps, and connectors. A small assortment of zip ties, SS screws, bolts, nuts and washers can come in handy as well. A caulk gun and a couple of tubes of polyurethane or silicone sealer, a tube of Gorilla Glue or equivalent can become your best friend! Most of these items are small, lightweight, and keeping a good selection aboard won't take up much stowage. While this list is far from complete, it will give you ideas to start with and build upon.

On larger vessels where stowage is more plentiful, you have an ability to lay in larger spares such as alternators, water pumps, impellers, fresh water pumps, heater components, toilet parts (seals gaskets and hoses), propellers, shaft(s), and spare hydraulic hoses and associated fittings.

I have a small bin onboard where I throw failed uncommon parts that I don't have duplicates of. This allows me to take the part with me if the numbers are faded, worn off, or corroded. Makes it easier to cross reference on the next run to the parts house.

Many of you may do this already, but a great use of your smart phone camera is recording pictures of parts and part numbers. Even recording the way something comes apart to assist in putting it back together can be very helpful, especially with wiring. The photo files are a great reference on trips to the supply house.

For new members that may be new to boating as well, your best resource for info just might be your fellow club members. There are many years of combined knowledge and experience that you can tap into just by asking. When it comes to storing your spare parts aboard, I've seen some very creative systems and a variety of convenient water tight, moisture proof containers. Ask a veteran of the seas to see how they do it. I can guarantee that other members have the exact same power plants as you. That information may be available in your QCYC Annual Directory and contacting that member could be a great resource for you regarding what to have on hand for spares.

There are few things more frustrating than having a small readily available part delay or even stop you in the middle of a voyage. I hope that something in this article might prevent that from happening to you!


