COMMODORE'S REPORT

NOVEMBER, 2015

have to begin by thanking everyone who made our Commodore's Ball such a wonderful night. I especially want to thank P/C Dick and Teri McGrew. I know they had a host of volunteers who deserve thanks but I am not sure I know all the names. Therefore I will not go into a long list and neglect someone. You know who you are so thank you to everyone. Our family especially enjoyed the hospitality of the club. The farmer's market travel theme

coupled with the Huskies hit on two of our favorite things outside of boating and Queen City. Thank you to everyone who made this a special night that we will remember the rest of our lives.

One of the major tasks of the new commodore's fiscal year is the creation of an annual budget. Actually the process for this year's budget started in July. Our treasurer, Jan Gould, began the process by making year-end projections for the past year. We then met to formulate our first cut at a new budget. In early September during a joint Bridge, Planning and Finance and Board meeting many of the capital details were reviewed. This led to the adoption of the new budget during the board meeting in October. As in past years there was a lot of discussion. We can't

do everything we would like, so priorities were set based upon the best information available. Among the items we have budgeted for this year include the Centennial Celebration, continued dock maintenance, grounds enhancements, some house interior upgrades and finally the renovation of the restroom facilities at our Bainbridge Outstation. I would like to thank our Treasurer. Planning and Finance and the Board for their efforts and guidance.

Our original plan for the Outstation restroom renovation was to start this after the first of the new

year, however it now appears is we have a window of opportunity to accomplish this in the November – December timeframe. So if you plan on visiting Winslow during this time, the clubhouse restroom facilities will probably be off limits.

There are two major items on the horizon that we were not able to budget at this time. The first item is the replacement of work slip 3 or the large work slip. This work slip is showing its age as the amount of freeboard decreases. We have some estimations of the replacement cost, however further work is required to refine our requirements and cost. The second item is part of the mitigation for the Dock One extension. We are required to remove old pilings and skirting that is on the south side of

Dock 3. These pilings date back to the original dock 60 years ago or so. Currently the lake level is too low to get a barge and crane into that area. Our committee is working with the contractor and the Corps of Engineers to develop an approved mitigation plan. Once we have a better cost estimate and a timeframe to complete the project we will look for available funds.

On a positive note the Dock Electrical Project has been completed with final approvals received from the City of Seattle. This will allow our contractor to submit their last bill. When it has been paid we will have a surplus of funds from the bank loan. The project was completed within budget except for some small change orders. The remaining loan funds will be in excess of \$100,000. Your Planning and Finance Committee recommended to the Board that the funds be spent to pay down the outstanding 1999 notes and bonds that carry an interest rate of 7.5%. This year we will pay our normal annual amount plus the additional amount that the Board has now approved. By the end of the year the 1999 outstanding notes will have been paid off. We will have also paid in excess of \$150,000 of the 1999 bonds. The remaining outstanding bonds, about \$50,000, will be paid off next year. This is a full

three years in advance of the original 20 year term. I think that this is a strong testament to the financial leadership that has been shown by the Planning and Finance Committee, Board and Bridge for the past decade or two. Thank you to everyone.

Finally, during November your Fleet Captain is planning a land cruise to the Woodland Park Zoo. Sign me up, it should be fun. Also it is not too early to sign up to participate in the Christmas Special People's Cruise or the Holiday Light Boat parade. Please see Bill Field to volunteer for the Special People's cruise. Chuck Gould is chairing the Lighted Boat Parade. My thanks to everyone who volunteers and make these events special. Enjoy the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday also.

VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT

t's finally the time of the year we have all been anticipating! What time is that, you ask... Well it's time the lake level is rising again. I'm not sure what the Corps of Engineers is saying, but I have it from a reliable Queen City source who has been staring at one of the new aluminum dock ladders all summer, and by their visual gauge, the lake level is up about 2"





from the low water level. Hopefully your summer was more exciting than staring at dock ladders. This should serve as a reminder to check our dock lines and adjust them as needed. It would also be a good time to remove dock hoses from the hose bib connection prior to any cold snap.

HOUSE COMMITTEE

We had a report of a water leak in the galley above the stove, likely coming from around the hood fan. The House Committee believes the cause is likely failed caulking and they will be tending to it. Leaks are something we need to tend to promptly before we experience consequential damage. If you see something at the club that needs attention, advise a bridge member or any member of the House Committee.

DOCKS COMMITTEE

If you have need to occupy work slip #3 this fall, use more caution than usual. By all accounts the dock is secure, but it is reaching the latter stages of its useful life. There are plans to replace it within the next year. Apparently the flotation is losing some of its buoyancy, causing the dock to sit lower than it has in prior years. We are working with contractors to get estimates for

ERNEST W. LAURIDSEN

1927-2015

Ernest (Ernie) Lauridsen was a true son of Seattle and Danish to the core. He crossed the bar on Aug 29th of this year at the age of 87. He was born in Seattle and that was his home until very recently. He was a proud graduate of Lowell Elementary and Broadway High School. Ernie was the third of five kids in the Lauridsen home. His sisters both remember how neighbors would often come looking for help in repairing their cars and Ernie would always willingly helpeven extending his help beyond mechanical to doing detailing and painting! He was a great brother to his younger "Sis," helping her learn to drive and buy her first car, a 1941 Chevy. His older sister remembers that Ernie's favorite pastime after school was to devour some of his mom's cookies and a quart of milk while reading his comic books at the kitchen table! A big and stout kid, Ernie was friendly and had good humor but wouldn't take any "guff" when other kids tried to tease him. His size, good humor and interest in helping anyone who needed mechanical or "fix-it" help remained throughout his life.

After high school Ernie went into the Army and served until 1948 and then worked for his dad, who owned Yukon Transfer Co., a moving company, and then worked for a while as a plumber at Roto Rooter. After that, Ernie started his long, many- year career at the Seattle Water Department.

Captain Lauridsen lived most of his life on 11th Avenue just 3 or 4 blocks from the club. He was well known in his neighborhood for his detached garage in the alley where he helped any and all neighbors and many in the yacht club fix cars, trucks, appliances or whatever else needed fixing. The garage was extraordinarily equipped for the day and his help and advice was often sought. Club member Howard Klock fondly remembers Charlie and Ernie and "The Garage:" "Ernie was always messing around with cars and I hung around Ernie's garage a lot when I was a young kid. He had a big heart and was so kind and always telling stories - we cruised together up to Desolation with Ernie and Charlie." Skip Sethmann also remembers "The Garage:" "Ernie was generous and a great mentor and taught me a lot about engines and how to fix things – Ernie helped me fix my pickup one time when the engine blew up!" Both men and neighbors remember that Ernie could be gruff but his big heart and kindness were just under a paper thin surface.

Captain Lauridsen's love of his life was his beloved wife Charlotte ("Charlie"). After a divorce, Charlie returned to Seattle with her children and was introduced to Ernie by her former in-laws (his neighbors of many years). Ernie married Charlie in 1971 and he was her loving and fun-loving dance partner and husband for forty-four years until her death this year, just six months before Ernie's passing. His recreational passions were boating, RV outings and cars. His Danish descent was important to Ernie and he loved to cook certain Danish food dishes taught to him by his mother – especially his favorite red cabbage dish.

Ernie joined Queen City in 1969 and he and Charlie immediately became active in social events at the club. Ernie served in a number of capacities in the club; he was Meeting Night Steward in '72–'73, Photographer (Chairman) in '73–'74, Entertainment Committee 1976. In 1977 he was Head Waiter and in 1979 was in charge of the Fishing Derby. In 1980 Ernie started a long running chairmanship of the Membership Committee serving in that capacity through 1984. In 1985, he started another long running chairmanship of the Visiting Committee, serving through 1989.

In addition to his involvement with the Entertainment Committee, Ernie and Charlie were involved several years in the productions of the QCYC skits put on for the Bremerton YC's Heavy Weather Skits, a fierce competition enjoyed by all of the Grand 14 yacht clubs. He is remembered fondly by fellow club members for his good humor and his practice of often driving his pristine Model A coupe to Friday Lunch. Ernie and Charlie often invited relatives and friends to spend a weekend with them on their boat invitations that were always readily accepted.

Ernie owned several boats while a member of Queen City: the *Valhalla*, a 23' Tollycraft; the *Ivanhoe*, a 25' Chris Craft; the *Traesko*, a 31' Chris Craft and the *Miss Colleen*, a 22' Chris Craft.

Ernie was unstinting in his willingness to always lend a hand to neighbors, boating buddies, relatives and work colleagues at the Seattle Water Department. As an enthusiastic boater at Queen City and active member of an RV Club and a Model A club he had plenty of opportunity to use his mechanical skills to help his friends.

Ernie was an extraordinarily generous and loving son, brother, uncle, husband, stepfather, grandfather, and friend. He will be sorely missed by his sisters, Gertrude Poulsen and Esther Justin, and brother Harold Lauridsen, as well as a host of cousins, nieces and nephews and his four stepchildren (Charlie's children): Priscilla Richardson, Janet Minehan, Coby and Steve Scheldt and their children and grandchildren.









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
