Thanks to David and Veronica Ewton for putting on a fabulous "Grimm Halloween" party. There were some crazy costumes, for sure!


November foretells tough

BACK TO BUSINESS ON THE DOCKS AND THE STAIRCASE

VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT—We are fully back to business after the summer cruising season, and there are several projects underway to enhance our facilities and make the Queen City experience even better. Watch this space for info and updates.

As you are aware, the bridge has always had an open-door policy to hear the general members' needs and ideas. This summer a recurring theme was brought to us regarding the use of the Mainstation "U," QCYC member use of the reciprocal space and how we all are using the work slips.

Just as a reminder, the club policies are:

5.02. Moorage for Members -Members may have temporary
moorage at the reciprocal dock
at the in-station with permission
of the Bridge, or the dock
immediately in front of the
clubhouse for a period not to
exceed seven (7) nights in any
30-day period.

Members may have an additional seven (7) nights in any 30-day period at the transient moorage portion of the reciprocal dock.

On arrival, a member using temporary moorage shall enter the member's name and dates of stay in the moorage logbook located adjacent to the dock area in front of the clubhouse and pay the nightly moorage fee.

Some more friendly reminders:

When using the "U," the yellow loading zone must be kept clear. It is best if all boats sterntie to make the best use of the limited space. Always be aware that you could be asked by another member to move your boat to free up more space. If your boat is too large for the space behind the yellow line, consider we

the yellow line, consider using the reciprocal space as a courtesy to others, rather than side-tie north-to-south. And always put a probable departure date onto the sign-in sheet.

When using the reciprocal space, only one Queen City boat space (the east end) is available for member use. Rafting is ok and encouraged.

When using the workslips, reservations for a three-day stay may be made on the QCYC web site. Additional three-day reservations may not be made until the third day of the original reservation.

Thanks for adhering to these



policies. If you have thoughts or suggestions, feel free to contact me at vicecommodore@queencity.org.

Moving on to other news. If you visit the mainstation and it smells like Glidden, it's either because Gordy Foote has his usual brush in hand touching the place up or the highly trained professionals are painting in the staircases.

The staircase job was deemed too dangerous for us to do inhouse by the vice commodore (because the house committee wanted the vice commodore to do it himself). So an outside contractor with the proper



equipment will handle the task. Actually, this job is a capitol project and planned for in the yearly budget.

By the way, the next time you see a house committee member, give them a pat on the back for keeping the mainstation so well maintained. Better yet, join us at 9 a.m. on Tuesdays and lend a hand. Excellent doughnuts are provided.

Okay then, let's say you are strolling down Dock 2 and realize you have been tripping over the same deck plank for weeks. All it needs is a little tap down, but from a 20-lb. sledgehammer, and who has one of those lying around? The docks committee does, that's who, and they know how to use it!

How do you let them know about the issue? Easy. Go to the QCYC web site, click on "Facilities," then "Facilities Repair Request" and fill out the simple form.

Whether it's the mainstation, outstation or docks, you can report ANY necessary repair of club property on this form, and by doing so, allow our amazing and dedicated committee chairs to assign the tasks and keep track of those repairs.



TELL YOUR FRIENDS ABOUT US

MEMBERSHIP REPORT— There are a few openings for membership in the club.

There are, of course, waiting lists for moorage in the 229 slips at the mainstation, and the wait may be two to three years for the smaller slips. For longer 44-foot to 60-foot slips, the wait may be as much as five years. But temporary sublets by members may cut that wait down.

Those of you who may know people who want to join us, remind them of our outstations on Bainbridge Island, Deer Harbor on Orcas Island, Ganges Harbor on Salt Spring Island, and Thetis Island Marina on Thetis Island. Plus we enjoy reciprocal moorage privileges at yacht clubs throughout Puget Sound, Canada and other parts of the U.S. and the world.

You might mention that we have numerous club activities and cruises throughout the year and some sort of club social at the mainstation at least once per month. And don't forget the weekly Friday lunch and Saturday breakfast.

Prospective members must complete an application form, find two club sponsors to sign it and present a check for \$1,750 (that's a third of the \$3,000 initiation fee plus the first year's dues of \$750) to get the ball rolling. The remaining \$2,000 of the initiation fee and annual dues for \$750 would be billed in two equal payments during each of the next two annual billing cycles in October.

WHAT DO YOU DO WHEN . . .?

... You're walking down the dock or through the clubhouse and see something that's not right. It's a dripping faucet, a loose cleat, a broken downspout or simply something that needs tightening down.

How does that get fixed?

The first step in the process is letting the responsible committee chairperson know of the problem. To accomplish this and simplify the communications, the web team has set up a <u>FACILITY REPAIR REQUEST</u> page, under FORMS, on the QCYC web site. You're asked to fill out three of the six lines of information (the computer has filled in the other three). Those being what the problem is, where, and how to contact you if there are questions.

Once you click SUBMIT, the system records your request on the repair item database and simultaneously sends an email copy of your request to the appropriate chairperson. You don't have to try to figure out who to call, or leave a voicemail, or wait for a call back. Just record it on the web site. The responsible committees then address the issues during their next work sessions.

Queen City Yacht Club is a very large business with a significant clubhouse, massive dock space and a valuable remote location. One of the biggest challenges is knowing what requires attention, and your input, via the Facility Repair Request is a great help. No matter how big or small, please submit it and help protect our assets.

QUEEN CITY INTRODUCES HYDROPLANE RACING TO SEATTLE

It was at Lake Washington on June 27, 1926 when Queen City Yacht Club staged the firstever hydroplane race on Lake Washington.

Four vessels were on hand for the event.

Herb Munter won all three of the six-mile heats with his boat, "SAR."

Mike Shain was second in every race in his boat "Baby Trimmer."

The "Seattle Queen," piloted by J. A. Volger placed third in each event.

Jimmy Lyons' "Hispano" experienced mechanical difficulty and did not compete.

After the races were completed, Shain struck a piece of driftwood in his hydroplane. An air tank built into the boat kept it afloat. Queen City's C. A. Wheeler

rescued Mike Shain, observing that Shain had enjoyed a "good bath."

Queen City member Leo Huber arrived with a seaplane, and challenged Herb Munter and the "SAR" to a race.

As the contest began, Huber's seaplane struck a piece of driftwood (possibly the same piece

encountered earlier by Shain) and ripped the bottom out of the body. Huber pointed his plane toward shore, barely making the beach before sinking. He jumped ashore soaked and disgusted.

By all accounts, a memorable afternoon.

EIGHT BELLS

WILLIAM KARL STANNARD 1951 – 2017

Capt. William Karl Stannard, a professional boater among boaters, had an illustrious longterm career in the marine industry with Bayliner and Meridian boats. Bill crossed the bar June 26 in Anacortes at the age of 65 after a long battle with cancer.

At the time of his passing, Bill was QCYC member # 317.

Bill was born November 7, 1951 and grew up in Spokane, graduating from North Central High School there in 1970. He excelled in academics and earned a scholarship to Dartmouth College, but the draft and his father's illness changed his plans.

Bill served in the Army from February 1971 to November 1973, including a tour of duty in Vietnam where he earned a Purple Heart and Bronze Stars.

After military service, Bill earned his bachelor's degree from Eastern Washington University and a Masters in Physiological Psychology from the University of Washington.

His first job after graduation was at the Seattle Museum of History and Industry where he became curator of collections; helped set up small museums around the state, including the Sourdough Museum in Pioneer Square; and authored a book on the history of Seattle.

In the '80s Bill was living on his power boat and Janet Kenady was living on her sailboat moored next to each other at The Seattle Marina. One thing led to another and in 1986, they married and moved to La Conner together with her daughter Adrianne.

In 1988 Bill joined Bayliner Marine in Arlington. He held various positions there, including eight years as a test-boat driver. He worked in engineering and quality assurance and was factory captain and team lead for the yacht delivery and rigging crew. He and his team traveled throughout North America and Europe setting up boat shows and dealer shows, delivering yachts and providing customer service.

After Bayliner closed its plant, Bill continued his association with Meridian and Bayliner, delivering yachts and serving as a legal and technical advisor to the Brunswick Co. under Stannard Marine Consulting. He continued to make customer service calls until his death.

Bill had four passions in life: politics and current affairs, boats and boating, Seahawks and Mariners, and friends and family.

Bill read at least two newspapers daily and kept up on current affairs. He loved political discussions and held his Democratic beliefs dearly. But he maintained that when superficial classifications are stripped aside, Americans have more in common than not. For example, he took Adrianne to a Republican Caucus for educational purposes in 1992. The group was discussing the Republican platform, and before long Bill had taken over the discussion as well as the caucus. Instead of throwing Bill out of the meeting, the Republicans approached him to be a representative for Skagit County and Washington State at the Republican national convention. He declined.

Bill loved boats and boating and was passionate about learning everything about them. Bill and Janet lived aboard on Lake Union and at Shilshole Bay Marina in various boats, but Bill's favorite was his Meridian 490, which he purchased new and followed all the way through the production line to delivery.

Capt. Stannard had an excellent memory and, even over the phone he could walk boaters through diagnosing problems and then recommend repairs. He developed a devoted following of dealers and boat owners. He took his job seriously and had a perfect record of getting scheduled boats to even the big boat shows in Ft. Lauderdale and Miami, despite manufacturing delays, a frozen Hudson River or the occasional hurricane.

Bill was an avid Mariners and Seahawks fan, but Janet says he couldn't attend a game in person because he would get too emotional and start hollering and throwing things!

Most of all, Bill loved his friends and family. Nothing made him happier than to have them around to cook for and entertain. He was so proud of his grandchildren Henry and Lola as well as grand-nieces and nephew Lila, Jacob and Amelia.

Bill joined Queen City Yacht Club in 2008 and made many friends. While a member, Bill owned the "Jade," the beautiful 54-foot Meridian 490 that became Bill and Janet's home.

He will be missed by all who knew him.

Bill is survived by his loving wife Janet, brother Frederick, sister Marilyn Strom, step-daughter Adrianne, grandchildren Henry and Lola, and numerous nieces and nephews.

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
