SR 520 WEST APPROACH BRIDGE CRAWLS TO FINISH

SR 520 COMMITTEE REPORT

— The state Department of
Transportation (WSDOT) is in its
22nd year of the State Route 520
project and moving slowly toward
completing it.

WSDOT hopes to finish the West Approach Bridge North work this year. That's the new construction you see to the north of the old roadway between the new floating bridge and Montlake Boulevard.

There are three remaining phases. Please keep in mind that

only Phase 1a has been designed. Phases 2 and 3 are still just concepts, so we have no idea what the impact to Queen City Yacht Club will be.

Here is what they have told us so far:

Phase 1a — West Approach Bridge South. This work includes demolishing the old roadway and constructing a new threelane roadway to the south of the new north section from the floating bridge to Montlake Boulevard. The plan is to request design-andbuild proposals this spring and summer and award the contract in early 2018. WSDOT will design up to a certain percentage of the project and then solicit proposals from contractors to complete the plans. The means and methods won't be known until the contractor and design have been selected. Construction is expected to start in the spring of 2018 and take four to five years to complete.

Phase 2 — The Rest of the West. This work includes constructing a new Portage Bay Bridge from Montlake Boulevard to I-5. This phase will also use

the design-and-build contracting method. So again, the club won't know the impact on us until the contract is awarded. The current plan calls for constructing a temporary work bridge north of the current bridge to use in building a new westbound roadway. This temporary bridge will be built from east to west but currently is not expected to connect to the west side. It is expected to interfere with some of our moorage slips on the south side of Dock 3 but the extent of this interference will be not be known until the contractor is selected. After the west section is completed, the old bridge will be demolished and construction of the eastbound roadway will begin. This phase is estimated to begin sometime in 2020 to 2022 and is estimated to take six years.

Phase 3 — The Montlake Crossing. During this phase, a second bascule bridge will be constructed along the east side of the current Montlake Bridge. Construction is expected to begin in 2024 and take three years to complete. Little is known about the bridge at this time.

TIP YOUR CAPTAIN'S HAT TO THE CONFEDERATE NAVY NEXT TIME YOU SAIL INTO THE SAN JUANS

If it were not for the Civil War, and specifically the depredations of the Confederate states' warship Alabama, it's possible today's Queen City boaters would need to clear customs before enjoying the San Juan Islands.

Most of us know about the Pig War, but here's a part of that dispute you may not be aware of.

From the mid 1850's until after the end of the American Civil War, the United States and Britain maintained occupation forces on San Juan Island. Both nations were embroiled in a border dispute resulting from a deal struck to end the War of 1812.

The Treaty of Ghent had

CELEBRATING A GOLDEN DAY 50 YEARS AGO

n May 18, 1966 Queen City Yacht Club captains postponed their regular Wednesday meeting to hold a gala celebration in recognition of the club's 50th birthday.

More than 180 members were here to see the unveiling of the anchor monument that still stands at the head of the driveway. A weather balloon with a QCYC burgee attached was launched before everyone went inside for a champagne dinner and entertainment.

At the next Wednesday meeting, P.C. Herb Klock reported that many people had reported

seeing a UFO the night the weather balloon was released.

A hunter found the balloon later in the Cascade Mountains with the burgee still attached. He returned it to the club and collected a \$25 reward for his efforts.

The burgee is on display in the Third Deck trophy case.

declared the border between the U.S. and British territory of Canada ran down the center of the "main channel separating Vancouver Island from the mainland."

Problem: The Brits assumed the "main channel" was Rosario Strait, while the Americans insisted the treaty referred to Haro Strait. At stake was ownership of the San Juan archipelago, located between those two boundaries.

During the Civil War, Britain frequently violated a neutrality treaty with the U.S. government. Among other violations, they provided an enormous warship to the Confederate Navy-large enough and well enough armed to repel almost any Union navy vessel.

The Confederate Navy sailed this ship as the Alabama. So many prizes were taken that some historians credit the Alabama with keeping the Confederate



economy going after the battle of Gettysburg.

After the Union victory over the Confederates, the U.S. sued Britain for damages wrought by the Alabama. Some U.S. senators wanted Britain to cede most of Canada to the U.S. as compensation. The U.S. and Britain agreed to let Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany settle the warship Alabama claims. The Kaiser fined the British \$2 million, but left most of the border between the U.S. and Canada at the 49th parallel.

In what a football fan might call a "favorable spot by the

official," Kaiser Wilhelm settled the Pig War by declaring that Haro Strait, not Rosario Strait, was the main channel between Vancouver Island and the mainland.

Britain withdrew any territorial claims on the San Juan Islands, and to this day they remain one of the scenic and recreational gems of the United States.
