VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT

s of this writing we have returned from a great weekend at the Tacoma Yacht Club's Daffodil Festival. We had great weather during the trip to Tacoma and back as well as during the Sunday parade. We did have rain as we gathered for the trivia contest on Saturday. So, a normal weekend in the Northwest. A thank you to Don and Judy Wilson for volunteering Hey Jude as the Officers' Boat, Carol Soffel for leading the decoration efforts and Chuck Gould for the bagpipes. A special treat.

By the time you read this, Opening Day week should be well underway. This is the time of year where everyone gets to participate, from the cleanup at Winslow, Pride of Queen City and the many events of the Opening Day week. We will be involved in most of the official functions, which is one of the joys of "going through the chairs." We get to meet a lot of nice people and see how the other half lives. Thank you to everyone who volunteered their time and effort to make Opening Day such a fun event.

DUMPSTER: On a more serious note we have had a recent series of problems with unauthorized use of the club dumpster. The dumpster is

clearly marked with what can be disposed of and what cannot. Recently we have a TV, liquid paint and finally a U Line refrigerator left in the dumpster. Electronics, including TV's and computers, must be disposed of in accordance with city and state's "E Recycle" policies. You can find the nearest disposal site by visiting the web at www.ecyclewashington. org and entering your location. Disposal of paint in a liquid state is considered a hazardous material and must not be put in the dumpster. Latex paint can be hardened and then placed in the dumpster. Most major hardware stores and paint stores sell a product that will quickly cure paints for disposal. I have been told that cat litter will also do a good job, although I have never tried this myself. You can visit the Seattle Government website www. hazwastehelp.org/hhw/disposallocations to find a disposal site if you cannot cure the product.

Finally the disposal of refrigerators is not authorized, as they "...contain chlorofluorocarbons (CFC's) which are regulated under the Federal Clean Air Act. These items cannot be disposed of and should be recycled. Recycling will insure that CFC's are safely removed for recycling or disposal and are not released





CHARLOTTE (CHARLIE) LAURIDSEN

1917 - 2015

Charlotte (Charlie) Lauridsen crossed the bar for the last time on February 12th of this year at the age of 97. Charlie was born on March 28, 1917, in Leavenworth, grew up in Everett and graduated from Everett High School in 1936. Under "Charlie's" senior yearbook picture, the editors predicted, "She'll always dance her way through life." That was an exceptionally accurate prediction – literally and figuratively. Charlotte was definitely the "spunky" one of her family. As her daughter relates, "Charlie was NEVER shy. From early on she had her whole family wrapped around that little finger of hers and the others always bent to her schedule, her will, and her desires. Such power!"

Charlotte was a talented dancer from an early age, appearing on stage for the opening of Seattle's Fifth Avenue Theatre in 1926 at the age of eight. She went on to dance in many Everett events. Charlie then went on to attend the University of Washington, where she majored in art with a minor in dance (a dance major was not available) at UW. She was a member of Chi Omega Sorority at the University. She had her own dance studio in Snohomish when she left college after two years of study. She told great stories of taking the train to Snohomish three days a week to teach the local children their ballet and tap and try to help the lumberjacks learn a little bit about ballroom dancing. Charlie's daughter writes "These were some of the many adventures of our 'energizer bunny' mom." We are happy to remember that she had more than 97 years of a happy and healthy life and a natural, peaceful death. Charlotte's spirit was more adventurous than it was conventional. Other early adventures included climbing out her bedroom window, crawling over the porch roof to drop to the ground, swimming out to navy ships in Everett harbor with girlfriends to tease the sailors."

In June 1941 Charlotte married Harold Scheldt, her high school sweetheart and fellow Husky. Harold (Hec) worked in the purchasing department at Boeing and while they were in Seattle, the couple had three children, Priscilla, Coburn, and Stephen. Being the adventurous sort she was, Charlie agreed to her husband's plan to move the whole crew to Wichita, Kansas, in 1951 for him to start his own company. We're talking a cross country trip in December in the 1950 Ford with a baby in diapers, a

mom who's 5 month pregnant, and rambunctious 8 and 5 year olds in the mix. The woman had spunk and energy! Raising the children in Wichita was good, but the Seattle area was always home and the family returned there for many summer delights with the relatives. Charlie continued participating in pranks with the Scheldt family brood that are too numerous to mention

Charlie divorced from Harold in 1967. After Charlie's divorce, she returned to Seattle with Janet and Charlie was introduced to Ernie by her former in-laws (his neighbors of many years). Ernie and his Charlie married on June 18, 1971, and he was her loving and fun-loving dance partner and husband until her death forty-four years later. With Ernie leading the way, they engaged in all the activities at Queen City Yacht Club, toured the country in their RV, belonged to an active RV group, and, when they became Ford Model A owners, were active in a Model A club. During this time Charlie ran her interior design business (Design Trends) that focused on designing boat interiors for QCYC friends and helping people who were downsizing out of large homes.

Ernie joined Queen City in 1969 and he and Charlie immediately became active in social events at the club. Carolyn Rolstad writes "I remember Charlie and Ernie fondly. It also became a dressing room for the performers (including the guys) when we did the skits and Entertainment Night productions. She was a very energetic lady and was always helping out wherever she could. With perfect health and great partners Charlotte did indeed "dance her way through life."
