My goodness. It's a busy, busy month. Enjoy!



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



Margaret had been trained as a teacher but joined the Port of Seattle as a dispatcher when teaching jobs were scarce. She was one of the first women dispatchers and one of the first police officers of her gender at the Port.

Margaret was a rower in high school and has first-place medals from the National Women's Rowing Association from 1966 and 1967.

Dave was Queen City's commodore in 2003. This was the year that spousal memberships started garnering attention.

"While I privately supported this," he said, "I kept my opinion to myself until the change of watch. At that time, I added my signature to a list of members who supported the issue.

"I'm very appreciative of what the past bridges have accomplished," he added, "and I'm particularly proud of the current bridge. They've done a lot to enhance the image of the club. I know how hard that job can be."

Both Dave and Margaret have ideas for making Queen City a better place in the future.

Both support the thought of tying the privilege of moorage to service with the organization. "That might solve our problem with 'storage boats'," Margaret said. "Perhaps a point system could be established."

On the other hand, they empathize with people who value their QCYC membership but aren't able to use their boats.

"It's like a man having to give up his driver's license,"

Dave said, "so I am sympathetic to it. It's tough to give it up. But if you aren't using your boat, you probably aren't using the club much either."

Dave would like to see QCYC mentor disadvantaged youth to give them a valuable life skill. "I haven't thought it through yet," he said, "but it might be a program promoting boat handling for young people similar to Sea Scouts on a small scale."

Dave and Margaret would like to see new members, in particular, become involved in club activities early on.

"It's what they need to do to appreciate what they have here," Dave said.

As for Hemingway, neither of the Krows has any illusions as to his ability to be involved.

ver wonder what Queen City members do to help Seattle celebrate another Opening Day of Boating Season?

This year the club has arranged to feed 1,325 pheople — local visitors and those in town from as far away as Vancouver during opening-day festivities Wednesday through Sunday, May 3-7.

FROM THE TOP OF THE WORLD TO THE BOTTOM

Retired United States Coast Guard Captain William Andersen will talk about his experiences and observations from his ventures to the Arctic and Antarctica in Queen City's next speaker's event, Wednesday, May 24.

Andersen grew up on Hood Canal, near Silverdale and graduated from the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 1961.

He sailed aboard the Coast Guard cutter Northwind as a deck watch officer home-ported in Seattle; was executive officer aboard the cutter Fir, a

Seattle-based buoy tender; sailed the cutter Eagle, training cadets at the Academy; commanded the cutter Clover, a buoy tender in Sitka, AK; was executive officer and commanding officer of the Polar Star out of Seattle.

In all, he had five adventures to the Arctic and three to Antarctica.

Andersen retired from the Coast Guard in 1988 after 27 years of commissioned service. More recently, he sailed briefly on a crab processor and fishing tender in Alaska. He joined the Puget Sound Pilots in 1992 and worked as a pilot for 12 years, retiring in 2004.

Presently, Andersen is a consultant with the Pacific Maritime Institute in Seattle, where he teaches continuing-education courses for members of the merchant marine, and works as an expert in ship-handling and navigation in the marine industry.

The meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on the Third Deck.

CAPTAIN MARK H. FREEMAN

1934 - 2017

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT — Capt. Mark Freeman, QCYC #007, a long-time, well-known figure in the Seattle Maritime industry, crossed the bar in January at the age of 83.

His loving wife of thirty-three years, Margie, has written the following wonderful eulogy:

Born in Seattle on Lake Union, Mark grew up on the docks of his parents' family business and began his storied tugboat career at the age of eight, working for his dad, O.H. "Doc" Freeman, pumping boats and working as a deckhand for him on anything that floated.

At 13, Mark purchased his first tug, the "Seal Rock," and began a log-patrol business on Puget Sound and Lake Union.

He attended B.F. Day Elementary, Hamilton Middle and Lincoln High schools and helped out at the marine-supply store known as "Doc Freeman's." He found through the teachings of his mentor, Jack McCrary,

that he was a natural born captain, and he thoroughly enjoyed it.

At 16, Mark purchased a bigger tug, the "Jerkmore." He said, with a grin, "with that boat I could jerk more logs off the beach."

After high school, Mark went on to the University of Washington for a couple of years, but nothing held his interest as much as tugs.

He continued his tug-boating career until he joined the U.S. Coast Guard in 1955. Stationed in Westport for four years, he ran motor lifeboats on the bar. That was before they had self-righting boats, helmets or much more than lifejackets. He was extremely proud of his work as Boatswains Mate Second Class in the Coast Guard, and was credited with directly saving 37 lives and countless vessels, earning him the Coast Guard Commendation Medal.

Mark left the Coast Guard in 1959, returning to Seattle and purchasing Fremont Boat Company from his folks. He continued the huge used-boat brokerage (with towing on the side) and ran the family businesses with his Mom after "Doc" passed in 1963.

He learned to be a tough but honest businessman. He was a staunch believer in private property and the working waterfront and led the Lake Union Association to success in local and state politics. By 1967 he tired of selling boats, so he changed the operation into a marina and got serious with the Fremont Tugboat Company.

The next few years saw him marrying Aneva "Ginger" Blake. He helped raise her children, Monty and Tracy, and had a son he was deeply proud of, Capt. Erik O. Freeman. His divorce in 1976 put him on different paths of interest, including the Retired Tugboat Association where he met lifelong friends and cruising buddies.

Margie entered his life about this time, first as a moorage customer, then as his bookkeeper. And in 1984 he married her, the love of his life. They were inseparable for the rest of his life, working and having fun together daily, going back and forth to their floating home from the business. Where one was, the other was close

by. Lovebirds until the end.

Mark was an avid photographer, taking as many as 5,000 photos a year – mostly of tugboats, of course. He always carried his camera, which got easier with better technology. He was the guy who always said "Stop! I have to get that picture."

Boats and girls – in that order.

About 20 years ago, he stopped towing commercially and sold Fremont Tugboat to Erik and his best friend, Tom Bulson. Erik had had control of a tugboat wheel from age 11 and both had learned the finer points from Mark. They are keeping up his legacy.

Mark still did the odd tow job in the marina and, of course, ran the other businesses with Margie. However, there was a new venture: Mark Freeman's Maritime Museum!

The computer became his friend. He stored hundreds of thousands of photos, ran a blog, collected artifacts and models and built on his personal collection which is hard to rival.

He genuinely enjoyed conversations with family, crew or friends, impromptu or with food, so gathering at the round

table in the office happened frequently. He had a wonderful sense of humor and a warm smile. And he had a thousand sayings to fit just about any situation. "Get the slack out of the headline" was a favorite onboard or on land.

One of the delightful things about Mark was he was rarely wrong; he had a sixth sense about people and business. Someone was always coming to him for advice and he was a mentor to many. And with those he cared about he sometimes gave advice not asked for. Either way, he had a knack for being right.

He was a great man, an unsung leader, teacher, author and hard worker, a unique soul who knew where his compass was pointing from an early age. With quiet perseverance, he never wavered and got to celebrate the 100th anniversary of his business, Fremont Boat.

All you needed to do to be a success in life was to be smart and work hard, he said, but above all else, be nice.

He was right about that too.

Margie ends her eulogy with this final farewell:

"The outpouring of love and condolences by his many friends is so appreciated by his family but he didn't want any services or celebrations. He wanted us to continue to have one of the lunches or coffee with friends to keep it meaningful to him.

Our suggestion would be to find your own way to 'be nice' in his honor. Fair winds, my love, and following seas. See ya over the next swell, Cap."

Mark joined Queen City Yacht Club in 1964 and owned many

boats while a member: "Shuttle," a 30-foot U.S. Navy tender; "Manila," a 46-foot boat built by Moran Shipyards; "Standfast," a 45-foot U.S. Army boat; "Magic," a 30-foot cruiser; "HMS," another Navy surplus craft; "Sovereign," and "A-1, both 42-foot Everett Marine boats; and, finally, "Blueberry," a 65-foot Detroit Diesel 330 HP Birchfield Boiler.

He is survived by his wife, Margie; son, Erik (Heidi) and granddaughter Marina Freeman; son Monty (Karen) Freeman; daughter Tracy Carlson (John); and their mom Aneva Freeman. Other survivors include nephews Howard (Michelle) and Scott (Debbie) Stoppelman, niece Paula (Richard) Kelley, sister-inlaw Ellen Coyne and everyone's extended family.

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
