# OCYC OUTSTATION **CRUISE GUIDE**

(Editor's note: This cruising guide, published in the June issue of the Bilge Pump, was so popular with people preparing their Summer 2017 cruise season, it was suggested running it again so that members who may have missed it before can make a copy to take with them to the San Juan or Gulf islands. So here it is again. Happy Cruising!)

VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT — With the 2017 cruising season underway, we should share each of our outstations'



information and policy for Queen City members. Have Fun!

#### Thetis Island Marina

Location: This is the first marina you encounter as you enter Telegraph Harbor and is on the west side of the harbor.

QCYC use area defined: Phoning ahead is required and members are strongly encouraged to phone as far in advance as possible. Before reaching the dock, hail the "Thetis Marina harbormaster" on VHF 66A for slip assignment. QCYC members may be asked to raft together if space is tight. Occupancy limits may be found in Club Rule 12.04 on page 139 of your annual. There is 30 amp power and potable water on the docks. Although the marina has its own desalination plant, it's

best to check with the harbormaster to see if the Gulf Islands are under water restrictions.

Contact information: 250-246-3464 or VHF 66A.

Instructions on arrival: Following arrival and securing your vessel, contact the harbormaster either at the fuel dock (the building with the green roof on the dock) or shore-side in the grocery. The harbormaster has the QCYC registration book, which you are required to fill out.

Amenities: The marina has a

convenience grocery, liquor store and post office. There is an onsite restaurant with indoor and outdoor seating. Families are welcome.

Comments: It's a short walk from the marina to the BC Ferry Terminal that connects Thetis Island to Chemainus on Vancouver Island. The town of Chemainus is known for the many murals on buildings in town, craft stores, restaurants and dinner theater.

## **Salt Spring Marina**

Location: The marina is at the very north end of the harbor at the town of Ganges, past the Canadian Coast Guard and Ganges Marina docks. Look for the large red building, which is Moby's restaurant, located on the marina property.

QCYC use area defined: Members are strongly encouraged to phone as far in advance as possible. Prior to reaching the dock, hail the "Salt Spring Marina harbormaster" on VHF 66A for a slip assignment. QCYC members may be asked to raft together if space is tight. Occupancy limits may be found in Club Rule 12.04, page 139 of the QCYC annual. There is 30 amp power and potable water on the docks. However, if the Gulf Islands are under restricted water use, the marina water is turned on only during specific hours of the

day. Plan accordingly.

Contact information: 250-537-5810 or VHF 66A.

Instructions on arrival: After arriving and securing your vessel, proceed to the head of the marina. There is a small office building to the left as you leave the dock. The harbormaster has the QCYC registration book, which you

are required to fill out. Be sure to get the gate code for re-entry during your stay.

Amenities: The marina has coin-operated showers and laundry (Canadian currency), plus WiFi.

Comments: Ganges is a fullservice destination. One can walk to the center of town (about onefourth mile) or take the dinghy and tie up at the Rotary Club dinghy dock on the west side of the Ganges Marina. (A \$1 donation is requested for dock maintenance.) There are many restaurants, a fully-stocked grocery store, a hardware store with marine supplies, a drugstore and a BC liquor store all within a few blocks of each other. On Saturdays from April to October, an impressive farmer's market is held in the civic park two blocks from the center of town. (Pets are not allowed.)

#### **Deer Harbor Marina**

Location: This is the southwest corner of Orcas Island. The marina is the first commercial marina as one enters the harbor and is located on the east side.

QCYC use area defined: The QCYC-contracted dock space is identified by the yellow highlighted bar in the Deer Harbor aerial photograph on our website and by a QCYC sign affixed to the

west side of the dock. The entire east side of that float and the "dogleg" part of the west side are devoted to normal marina transient moorage and are subject to overnight fees. No reservation is necessary as this is a first come, first served tie up. Thirty-amp power and potable water is available dockside. Rafting is allowed up to three deep. Occupancy limits can be found in Club Rule 12.04, page

139 of your QCYC annual. Tying up anywhere outside the QCYC area is considered normal transient moorage and the marina is due their standard overnight fee.

Contact info: 360-376-3037 or VHF 78A (but neither is necessary to stay at the QCYC area)

Instructions on arrival: Following arrival and securing your vessel, proceed to the head of the marina. Continue past the small store and down the ramp on the far side to the office/gift shop. The attendant inside should have the QCYC registration book, which you are required to fill out.

Amenities: The marina has coin-op showers and laundry plus WiFi.

Comments: The small convenience store onsite has an adequate selection. It also serves as a small deli with food prepared on-site. The marina also affords access to a small swimming pool across the street (check with the office during registration as the pool tends to be in or out of service). There is also a U.S. Post Office across the street. The Deer Harbor Restaurant is about a mile north of the marina and an easy walk, or the restaurant will provide pick-up service. Good walking and bicycling opportunities



are nearby.


# Bainbridge Island (aka Winslow)

Location: Halfway in on the north shore of Eagle Harbor. The Eagle Harbor Public Dock is directly to the east and a private residence sits to the west. The end pilings and docks are clearly marked with Queen City signs.

This is the club's main outstation and is owned by the

club. The dock is "U" shaped, with 30-amp power and potable water throughout. From May 15-September 15 every year, members can tie up on either side of both fingers on a first come, first served basis. Dock A is the western finger and Dock B is the eastern finger. Rafting up to three deep is allowed and encouraged during busy periods (Memorial Day, Fourth of July and Labor Day weekends).

During the winter months



(September 15-May15) visiting moorage is limited to the outside of both fingers as the inside area (the inside of the "U" ) becomes seasonal long-term moorage for members.

All vessels should be moored with bow to the water side (south) -- or stern to shore (north) -- with one exception: The one vessel nearest to shore on the east (Eagle Harbor Public Dock) side of Dock B should tie up with bow to shore to prevent grounding of running gear during low tide.

The shore side of the cross-connecting dock is reserved for dinghies, as low tides prohibit any larger vessels. The water (south) side of the cross-connecting dock will allow large vessels to side-tie. However, members are encouraged to stern-tie (aka Mediterranean-tie) during busy periods.

Instructions on arrival:
Following arrival and securing one's vessel, members should proceed to the clubhouse and register. You will need your QCYC proximity key card to both depart and enter the dock area as well as the outstation clubhouse. Inside the clubhouse you will find the registration book immediately to the right, beside the main door. You are required to fill it out.

Amenities: The clubhouse is equipped with a full kitchen, restrooms, showers, laundry, cable television and WiFi, picnic tables and two charcoal grills. Horseshoe pits for your use are on the shore side lawn. There is a limited area for parking vehicles next to the clubhouse. Members are reminded to complete a vehicle identification form (found at the registration desk) and leave it on the dashboard of the vehicle in case it needs to be moved.

Comments: The city of Bainbridge Island has countless resources, which makes it a very popular destination for club members. One will find a grocery store, small chandlery, movie theater, U.S. Post Office and numerous restaurants within a few blocks' walk. Approximately a mile away is a hardware store, drugstore and another grocery store.

been business as usual. This is the case where no news is great news.


-- Membership/Reception: Chairman Chris Benson has

# AROUND THE DOCKS

Try this if your computer kicks out QCYC news.

As the club becomes more dependent on electronic media, including calling up the Bilge Pump online rather than picking up a paper copy, a few members are finding messages from the web team are being rejected as spam, says Bill Brunkhorst, a team member.

It's a problem that has been preventing essential club information such as announcements of events, blast e-mails about news that crops up without much notice and even moorage billing from reaching its destination, Bill says.

To solve the problem, he suggests members follow whatever protocol is set by their internet service provider to identify <u>QUEENCITY.ORG</u> as a trusted domain for receiving e-mail.

If you can't figure that out, Bill did some research and found a guide on how to set up trusteddomain or safe-sender lists for a variety of service providers.

# **Ship's Store Summer Hours**

The Ship's Store in the mainstation has switched to limited hours once a month during the summer cruising season.

#### The Boat Number Memo

This year's summer cruising checklist had a new hitch in it, and many boat owners who waited until the last minute to get their boat-registration stickers affixed to the hull may have a knotty problem.

About 19,000 Washington boaters were notified by the U.S. Coast Guard in March that the vessel-identification numbers on their registration do not coincide with the hull identification number stamped on the boat.

While the majority of vessels registered in Washington do have compliant numbers, the situation has been fairly chaotic for those who found they couldn't renew their state registrations online because of the situation. And until the numbers are updated, owners are not be able to register, renew or title their vessel.

The hull identification number is molded or affixed to the starboard side of the transom. It must contain at least 12 digits.

## JAN LAFOUNTAINE

### 1950 - 2017

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT --One of our most likable, welcoming and popular members, Jan LaFountaine, passed quietly away February 3 at a young 66.

Jan was born in Reno, NV, but her family relocated to Portland, OR when she was very young. She attended elementrary school there and went on to attend Franklin High School where she graduated in 1968. She was a good student and a hard worker.

Although she didn't attend college, Jan graduated from high school through a fast-track accounting program and went to work immediately for US bank of Oregon. In a couple of years, she advanced to the bank's stock-trading department, becoming a trader.

In 1974, Jan married Dennis McEachern of Portland, and soon daughter Jennifer arrived. This marriage did not last, and in 1976 she met Mark LaFountaine on a blind date. Later that year Jan and Jennifer became a new family with Mark in Vancouver, WA.

There, they boated the Columbia River in a 21-foot Bell Boy cruiser.

In 1977, the family moved to Anaheim, CA where Mark went to work for General Electric Co., in Los Angeles. Jan was anxious to be back working and soon landed a job at nearby Disneyland Park. Jan loved her time at the park and worked first in merchandising and later as assistant to the director of marketing. Soon after, Jan and Mark had their son Chad.

The next year the family moved to San Diego, where Jan went to work once again in banking at San Diego Trust and Savings Bank. After three years, the family was back in Anaheim where Jan returned to Disneyland's marketing department for the remainder of her time in Southern California. She loved to take her small children to the

park, sometimes several evenings a week, to see various entertainment and musical shows.

In 1985, Jan, Mark and the children returned to the northwest. They settled in Fairwood Greens in Renton and Jan was thrilled to be moving into her first "brand new" home.

Jan became a bit restless staying home and took a part-time job at Hazelwood Elementary School as a playground monitor and office assistant. It wasn't long before she accepted a better position at the Renton School District headquarters where she worked in the business department. She eventually became assistant to the business director there.

Jan and Mark soon became interested in boating again and reconnected with old friends. They bought another 22-foot Bell

Boy and enjoyed cruising Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands with their friends. Jan longed for a bit more comfort afloat than the little Bell Boy cruiser offered, so she and Mark bought a classic 1966 32-foot Tollycraft "woody." The years passed and other boats followed, but the old Tolly always remained the family's favorite. Many happy family memories were made while cruising that boat. She and Mark joined Roche Harbor Yacht Club in 1990.

Jan excelled at her job at the Renton School District. She was friendly, courteous, helpful and, above

all, professional. Her hard work and wonderful personality helped her win promotion to assistant to the superintendent. She enjoyed working with the school board, parents, teachers and administrators and earned their respect. Her job required her to attend all school board meetings and record the proceedings. Many times she worked long into the evening

as she followed the meetings' progress.

In 1995 she and Mark joined Queen City Yacht Club and brought their 32-foot Bayliner "Blind Date" into the club. It was aptly named because Jan bought the boat, sight unseen, in Seattle while Mark was out of town on business. And, of course, they had met on that blind date so many years ago. (They named the dinghy "Second Date.")

Jan always sought challenges and soon became interested in the assistant position to the superintendent of the Mercer Island School District. She was so interested in the job that she insisted Mark and she go to the district office to check it out, even thought it was a Sunday afternoon.

The superintendent, who was working overtime that Sunday, soon spotted Jan, peeking in the windows. She was embarrassed. But the superintendent invited her in for a chat.

Jan was always convinced that impromptu "interview" went so well that it gave her an edge in seeking the job. She was indeed hired after the district reviewed more than 25 qualified applicants.

Jan worked successfully in that role until her retirement in 2014, again making many friends along the way. She enjoyed her daily noontime walks and often covered three or four miles during her lunch-hour break.

Jan's favorite interest outside of work was spending time with her family. She also enjoyed boating and camping trips and a bit of world travel. She went on safari in South Africa and visited South America with stops in Chile and Argentina.

There were many Caribbean, Mexican and Hawaiian cruises, too, and beach trips to Hawaii.

Jan was excited about her prospects and new-found freedom in retirement and was happy to make the move to another new home in Arizona. She enjoyed relaxing in the desert sun and spending time on her patio in Sun City West.

Jan and Mark joined Queen City in 1995 and were active socially through many activities, events and committees. Jan was active in Tarettes and was always ready to assist Mark as he held several posts.

victim escaped death) have been identified, according to BOAT US.

Electric-shock drowning (ESD) occurs when an AC electrical current flowing in the water passes through the body of an individual immersed in the water.

The electrical current causes muscular paralysis which impairs one's ability to swim or stay afloat, leading to drowning.

# WARNING: GRIEF ON A REEF UP AHEAD

Many cruises on the Salish Sea include a happy stopover at Pirate's Cove, on De Courcy Island. But if you plan to stop there this summer, check a guidebook before entering the cove.

Those who approach by line of sight have often come to grief on a reef there. And those who inhabited the place in years gone by sometimes found grief there as well.

An English-born con artist named Edward A. Wilson settled there on De Courcy Island in the late 1920s, adopting the name "Brother XII". He convinced followers he was the twelfth disciple of a spiritual being associated with the Great White Lodge and hundreds of people flocked to the Nanaimo area to join his commune there.

One condition of entry into the group: the applicants must sell all their worldly goods, convert the proceeds to gold, and gift it all to Brother XII.

The commune eventually owned nearly all of De Courcy Island, as well as a small community on Vancouver Island south of Nanaimo, Cedar by the Sea. Brother XII preferred to spend most of his time on the island. He theorized that he would have a chance to flee if Nanaimo-based law enforcement staged a raid on his operations. Pirate's Cove was Brother XII's port and base of operations on De Courcy.

Brother XII worked his believers as if they were slaves. Farming, fishing, forestry, and any other enterprise Brother XII could instigate. Overworked, underfed and locked in a private prison at the first hint of insubordination -- Brother XII's residents of Pirate's Cove had very little fun at all.

But the pilgrims kept

coming. Eventually, the gold secreted away on De Courcy was said to be worth over \$1 million. And that was back when gold sold for \$20 an ounce. (The price of gold a few weeks ago was \$1,262 per ounce.)

Brother XII's excesses ultimately brought him down. Many of his converts lost faith in Brother For almost 90 years, visitors to Pirate's Cove have kept a lookout for any portion of the millions in gold coins and bullion once reputed to have been left on the island. It's likely that Brother XII took his fortune with him when he fled.

Brother XII was never arrested. There was a report of his death,

XII when he claimed to be the reincarnation of the Egyptian deity, Osiris. And about that same time, he was involved in a scandalous affair with the wife of a convert.

Eventually, one of his prisoners on De Courcy broke out of his cell, rowed to Nanaimo, and alerted authorities to a variety of crimes committed by Brother XII.

Brother XII's hope that his island location would provide a head start from the law when his situation blew up proved true. After destroying the colony buildings on De Courcy, he and his primary mistress, Mabel Skottowe, (aka "Madam Z") escaped on their private tug boat.

in Switzerland, in 1934. The son of Brother XII's attorney insisted that Wilson's death was fabricated, and that he was present when Brother XII and his father met, years later, in San Francisco.



# FLEET CLEAN UP FOR SOLD-**OUT 2017 QCYC JUNIOR BOATING PROGRAM**


The Queen City Junior Yacht Club is doing so well the season sold out. But you still may get your youngster's name on the cancellation list and hope.
