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DOCKS COMMITTEE!

Upcoming Docks Fun Day & Cold Weather Considerations

Summer's officially over, and won't be back for a while. It's time to begin taking some cold weather precautions in the marina.

First and foremost-please disconnect your water hose from the faucet unless it's actually in use. That may seem like a pain in the transom, but there's good reason for it. Attaching the hose to the water pipe increases the amount of metal connected to the pipe and exposed to the air. Believe it or not, that can make a significant difference in how quickly the faucet freezes up when the temperature drops below 32-degrees. It only takes a moment and costs no money to disconnect your hose- it takes a lot of man hours and possibly hundreds of dollars to repair a ruptured water pipe.

Have you considered using "snubbers" on your mooring lines? During the late summer windstorm (remember those 60

mph gusts?) we suffered damage to the marina. Some boats heaving against their lines pulled up mooring rings and split planks. When a mooring line fails, the boat- as well as the club facilities, could be damaged. A "snubber" allows a very short line, or a line that connects mostly vertically, to have the same amount of "give" that a longer, or more angled line provides. Consider a snubber for your very short or vertical linesthe damage you prevent may be to your own boat.

Last year, on the first icy day, the phone rang at the Docks Chairman's house. A member inquired, "When will there be somebody here from the Docks Committee to spread rock salt on the docks? It's slippery out there!" The answer is; the Docks Committee does not provide a deicer spreading service- but we do provide de-icer. Look for 5-gallon buckets on your dock, labeled "Ice Melt." Feel free to open the lid, and use the plastic container on the top of the rock salt to spread the ice melter in any and all places where it looks like it is, or could be slippery. Ice melter will be placed on the docks by mid-October, and

will remain available until all danger of icy weather is past.

REGATTA POWER REPORT

Alaska 1000 Race — May 19 to July 4

About every few years since the inaugural race in 1928, IPBA has held the longest race ever. The race has had variations over the years from a Capital to Capital Race from Olympia to Juneau (last run in 2010 but first run in 1928) to the race AND cruise concept used this year.

The actual 2015 race consisted of 16 legs run on eight days evenly spread over the 6 weeks of travel. About one 2 leg race every 5th day. That left ample time for travel, exploring, fishing and relaxing. Except for a few days around a race day, the participants kind of did their own thing. The weather was exceptional for the entire race, as it was in Puget Sound, except no 90's, just some 80's. There were light winds on just about every day and pleasant crossings and transits of the less protected waters like Cape Caution and Dixon Entrance. July in Alaska was more rainy but still little wind and August was the usual glorious summer weather.

Fourteen boats left the kickoff dinner held at our Winslow out-station on Tuesday, May 19th. There were 10 racers and 4 cruise only participants. Three racers chose to only do one half of the race, the first half being a race unto itself called the Prince Rupert Trophy Race. They returned on their own after the first half dinner and awards held Iune 10th at Shearwater, Bella Bella, BC - about the 400 nm point. The winner of the first half was Jim Van Antwerp of BYC on Sarah B with 0.1147%. George Babbitt of GHYC was second on General Quarters with 0.2534%



and Bob and Sue Lindal were 3rd on *Suzy Q* with 0.2959%

The second half of the race was the Juneau Trophy Race and also covers about 400 nm, this year ending in Wrangell. The second half was won by Bob and Sue Lindal on *Suzy Q* with 0.3562%. George Babbitt of GHYC was again second on *General Quarters* with 0.3764%. Bill and Trish Anderson on *The Tillie* were 3rd with 0.6017%.

The low scores were due to the use of all electronics during the races except time of day — with only the 2 legs run as a boomerang out of the Ketchikan YC, using regular IPBA rules and observers from KYC. Racers could adjust speed to maintain their predicted SOG and follow the route on their chart plotters to maintain position. This was a much safer way to run in unfamiliar waters and made the race less of a preparation burden during what is actually a type of endurance test, though the actual challenge of maintaining position and especially SOG was difficult.

The Alaska 1000 Trophy is awarded to the top finisher when both halves are combined into one overall score. The final tally was extremely close with only 7 seconds of error separating first and second — in over 60,000 seconds of actual racing time. It did come down to who won the final leg! The closest log racing gets to a photo finish. George Babbitt of GHYC on *General Quarters* with 0.3190% won the Alaska 1000



Trophy Race. Bob and Sue Lindal on *Suzy Q* with 0.3310% took second. Bill and Trish Anderson on *The Tillie* were 3rd with 0.6563%.

The largest and most elaborate trophies in all of log racing are the Alaska trophies and at least one will be in the QCYC trophy case for a few years – The Juneau Trophy.

INTERNATIONAL CRUISER RACE ANACORTES & SAN JUANS, MAY 23RD

The ICR was held between the first and second race days of the Alaska Race with all 10 Alaska racers and 14 total racers. The course was a boomerang out of Cap Sante Marina in Anacortes, where the racers also stayed and enjoyed the new marina, including a pot luck steak fry on the party dock. Another pleasant day with light winds and calm waters on the 30 nm course made the challenges of the variable currents and eddies in Rosario Strait and Bellingham/Guemes Channels. The course went west down Guemes Channel around Blakely, Cypress and Sinclair Islands; crossing Rosario Strait twice and finished going down Bellingham channel and back up Guemes Channel. Observers were members of the local yacht clubs in Anacortes.

- ★ Bill and Trish Anderson on *The Tillie* won with an exceptional 1.7377%. John Murphey on *Sturdy Gal* of MBYC was second at 1.9046%. Jim Korzetz and P/C Dick Timmerman racing on *Freedom* for Poulsbo YC were third with 2.1606%.
- ★ Bob and Sue Lindal on *Suzy Q* were seventh overall with 2.6070% and first in class 3. Dave and Ryan Padgett on *Slipaway* were 11th overall and 3rd in class 3 with 2.8547%.

- ★ The best team score was the QCYC team of Bill and Trish Anderson, Bob and Sue Lindal and Dave Padgett.
- ★ The Pacific Northwest Champion is the best racer in the Century 21 competition which is the last four legs of the ICR and was won by John Murphey.

BARUSCH/CASTAGNA RACE WEST COAST CHAMPIONSHIP SAN DIEGO - JUNE 20, 2015

Eight racers from the West Coast competed in the Barusch/ Castagna Race in San Diego Harbor. The race had the usual ocean legs with ocean swells and the 1 to 2 kn currents in the harbor. Unfortunately, with 14 racers from our region on the Alaska Race, only one IPBA racer could make the trip.

But one racer from IPBA is all it takes. Fred Cole of POYC again won the Barusch Championship besting all the others by a wide margin. The Castagna Championship for the best 2 boat team from each of the 6 PCYA sections was won by the team from San Diego Cruisers Association.

NORTH AMERICAN INVITATIONAL – SANTA BARBARA – SEPT 12, 2015

The Championship for North American Cruiser Navigation is held each year in one of the NACA regions, this year in Santa Barbara for the first time and hosted by the three clubs in the area who are a recent additions to the sport of cruiser navigation.

Unfortunately, like the Barusch, not even Fred Cole could make the NAI, so we did not have representation for perhaps the first time ever. The NAI was won by Garry Adalian of San Diego.

SEATTLE YC'S STIMSON RACE – SEPT 19

Though it was another sunny late summer day for the race, the 15 to 20 kn winds played havoc with all the racers except perhaps one. It was a short 4 leg race in Port Madison through Agate Pass on a weak ebb and return.

The Latta Trophy for the Overall Winner was awarded to Jim Korzetz and P/C Dick

Timmerman racing on *Freedom* for Poulsbo YC with a tremendous "500" club score of 0.1751%. Bob and Sue Lindal and P/C Russ Oberg on *Suzy Q* with 0.8175% were second overall. Third overall went to BYC's Mike Henry on *Peachy Keen* with 0.9310%.

Ken Klett and Marv Elbon on *Klettitat* were 4th overall and 1st in class 5 with 0.9610%. Dave Padgett and Barry Rutten on



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Slipaway were 1st in Class 3 and 8th overall with 1.7208%. P/C's Larrie Chmela and Dean Lentgis on Four C's were 10th overall and 2nd in class 5 with 1.8405%. Bill and Trish Anderson on *The Tillie* were 12th overall and second in Class 3 with 2.1820%.



P/C WES MAULDIN

1919 - 2015

Charles W. "Wes" Mauldin crossed the bar on June 29th of this year at 96 years old. He was born February 16, 1919, on his grandfather's ranch in Elizabeth, Colorado, and died peacefully at Whisper Meadows Adult Family Home in Bothell. His last words were "thank you," words characteristic of the loveable, charming man. Three sons were blessed to call him dad and so many were honored to know him.

Wes grew up on a ranch and attended elementary school in Elizabeth, Colorado. Neither the ranch nor town had, at the time, electricity or running water. Wes' autobiography states: "There were ten students in my class with two classes in the same room. To get to school I walked a quarter mile across a meadow on the ranch to the railroad track, a half-mile along the track, a long quarter mile across a pasture to the edge of town, then two blocks in town. It was normally a fun walk with lots of birds and prairie dogs to watch. I can recall only once of being scared on my way home. It was when I was in the first grade during a severe winter storm, bitterly cold, snowing with a strong wind. Visibility was near zero and I was on the track uncertain where to turn off to cross the meadow when out of the storm my dad appeared about twenty feet away. He was a welcome sight."

After moving to Seattle as a teenager and graduating from Broadway High School, Wes combined fishing in Alaska in the spring and summer with starting his studies at the University of Washington, studies that were interrupted when he joined the navy as a pilot and navigation instructor from 1941–1945. It was during a brief leave from duty that Wes returned home to marry Irene, who preceded him in death in 2007.

After completing his military service, Wes returned to Seattle, where he completed his degree in mechanical engineering from UW, started his family and began his thirty-six years with the Boeing Company as an engineer.

After starting family life in a home he and Irene built on Beacon Hill, where he was a founding member of the Beacon Hill Presbyterian Church, he ultimately spent fifty years in the home they built on Mercer Island.

A past commodore of Queen City, his fondest memories were times spent on a boat with Irene and the boys. Many of us enjoy remembering the summer salmon bakes Wes orchestrated in the yacht club parking lot. In their later years, Wes and Irene became avid users of their motor home.

Past Commodore Mauldin joined Queen City in 1954 and soon after became an active and contributing member of the club. In 1956 he joined the Decorations Committee, and that started Wes' very impressive participation and activities record as a member of QCYC. In 1957 he participated in Sea Explorers and was a member of the Decorations Committee, in1958 he chaired Sunday Night Socials, in 1962 he chaired the Labor Day cruise, in 1967 he chaired the Salmon Bake and continued with this for several years through 1974, in 1968 he chaired the House Committee.

In 1969, Wes started through the chairs as rear commodore and, of course, in 1970 served as vice commodore culminating in 1971 as our commodore and in 1972 serving on the Board of Trustees (ex officio). Very interestingly, his sons told me that when Wes became commodore, it seemed to change his personality and his relationships – he became more social, reached out more to others, he seemed to be much more aware of what was going on with others at the club.

Not one to stop contributing after his years on the bridge, Wes again recorded an impressive list of contributions to the club. In 1974 Visiting Committee and Deceased Member Family Visitation, a position he filled through 1983, in 1975 *Bilge Pump* Editor. In 1976 he continued contributing as Old Timer's Night Chairman! In 1977 he was on or chaired the Regatta Committee again and Old Timer's Night (chairman). He then served on the Board of Trustees from 1978 - 1980. WHEW!

Wes is remembered by many as our "Old Timers Night Commodore"—when the current commodore turns the gavel over to a past commodore to run the meeting. Wes is also remembered as the P/C who would come to a general meeting and provide a bit of club history during our "Good and Welfare" time.

Wes owned several boats while a member for 61 years: the *Svenska Pojk*, a 30' Sundstrom; the *Svenska Flicka*, a 32' Farrell; the *Mariehamn*, a 34' Marblehead; the *Regmar*, a 38' Chesterman and *Island Stream*, a 42' Monk/Forder now owned by his son Walt.

Wes is survived by his three sons: Roger Mauldin (Diane), Arthur Mauldin (Gayle) and Walter Mauldin (Naida), five grandchildren and five greatgrandchildren. A memorial was held for Wes at the Queen City Yacht Club on September 14th.



CARL V. LARSON

1916 - 2015

Carl Larson passed away June 4th of this year in the company of loving family members at the age of 99, following complications from a fall. Captain Larson was QCYC seniority number 006! He was born in Seattle on February 13, 1916, and grew up here attending West Seattle High School and the University of Washington, graduating with a degree in electrical engineering.

After college Carl worked for GE and in the shipyards during the war and then as an engineer with the Boeing Company for over thirty years. Carl was a very highly respected electrical engineer and worked on the Bomarc missile and 747. He was a life member of Queen City Yacht Club and a 72-year member of the Seattle Sail and Power Squadron, where for many years he volunteered as an instructor, teaching navigation and boating safety skills to new boaters. He served as commander of the squadron in 1961. Carl was also a licensed ham radio operator.

Carl had three children by his first marriage: Rolf, Gregg (Bo) and Kristi and three step-daughters: Jan, Kathy and Cindy from his thirty seven year marriage with Maxine. The story of his meeting Maxine is a great one – they met at a singles group dance one Saturday night and they both felt something "clicked." It was a great surprise the next morning when they recognized each other — sitting across the aisle from each other at church! They were married four years later and remained faithful members of University Congregational Church for the rest of Carl's life – he was a member for over 50 years and served as an elder and on several committees. Carl and Maxine sailed, cruised, hiked, biked, traveled and cherished each other's company.

Carl was most happy when spending time on the water with his family and friends. He began sailing as a young man and enjoyed sailing and cruising in Washington and British Columbia waters every summer for most of his life. Carl's lifelong health and vitality were undiminished until only the last couple of years. Friends and family knew him as an accomplished, humble and loving man with an endearing wit and a light-hearted zest for life. He delighted in helping those around him at every opportunity and would go well out of his way to lend a hand.

His daughter Kristi writes: "A story is told in the careful creases of his pants and crisp button-down

shirt of a life lived with care to details. Of care taken, and of care given and received, especially from Maxine, whom he loved with complete devotion. And she has often said he was the love of her life. He was a great example to everyone around him for how to live a good life: how to keep your body healthy and more, how to be a great spouse, parent, friend and neighbor. He whistled while he worked, and he never swore or complained when things went wrong. He took every opportunity to give to others: he gave his help, his knowledge, his love, his caring. He was playful. He didn't just go for a walk; instead he skipped and twirled to the great delight of his children. He was particularly proud of his Swedish heritage and always got a huge kick out of listening to Stan Boreson. He watched, helpless, as one son fell to a cancer no amount of engineering could repair. And he grieved deeply. He thrilled to the wind and waves, and then, always a prudent mariner, he set his anchor with great care. But his strong light remained. And even at 95 and after two hip replacements, he wanted to go shopping for a new bicycle."

Carl joined Queen City in 1960 and was an active and contributing member. He and Maxine enjoyed many social events over the years and spent many weekends at our outstation in Winslow. They enjoyed cruising every summer to the San Juans, Gulf Islands and often to the Desolation Sound area and the Broughton Islands. Carl was a sailor when he joined and was chairman of our Junior Sailing Fleet in the 60's and Meeting Night Entertainment chairman in '65, but Carl's lasting committee interest was the house committee throughout his membership. He participated many years in innumerable work parties and as a member of the house committee – he was still an active member in 1995 – 1997 when he was in his 80s!

Carl owned or was partners on several boats during his lifetime: *Sea Urchin*, a small sailboat; *Marjorie B*, a 28' cabin cruiser; *Varuna II*, a 28' Ericson sailboat; *Rambler*, a 32' Island Packet sailboat; *Polaris*, a 36' Grand Banks; and later the second *Polaris*, a 48' Tollycraft.

Carl was preceded in death by his son, Rolf Larson, who died in 1991 at the age of 40 and is survived by his dearly loved wife, Maxine; his son Gregg (Bo) Larson and daughter Kristi Larson, and by his stepdaughters Jan Connelly, Kathy Tankersley and Cindy Brechwald.

IRA MILTON ZEASMAN

1921 - 2015

Charles Lindberg's flight over the Atlantic Ocean from New York to Paris in 1927 had a huge influence on Ira Milton Zeasman, who was born 6 years earlier on March 6, 1921, in Madison, Wisconsin, to Gladys and Otto Zeasman. He passed away on August 25, 2015.

As a very young boy, Ira was captivated by flight, and this fascination continued throughout his 94 years. His first ride in an airplane at age 11, and without his mother's permission, was in a "Robin," that took off from frozen Lake Mendota, a reward for guarding the plane while the pilot had lunch. He attended West High School in Madison, Wisconsin, where he met Jean Niebuhr in band class, and their friendship blossomed as they shared a music stand. "Zeas" entered the University of Wisconsin, where he majored in mechanical engineering and at the same time, earned his pilot's license through the Civilian Pilot Training Program. A favorite family story is that Zeas would fly his Waco biplane over Jean's family farm, doing aerobatic maneuvers to gain her attention.

The Boeing Company hired Ira as a design engineer in February, 1942. Jean and Ira were married in Madison four months later and quickly took up residence in Seattle. Ira began a 40-year career with the Boeing Company, where his management assignments included projects within the Wind Tunnels, where his special interest was in the development of the swept wing XB-47. Over the years followon assignments included, the Minuteman Missile, Dyna-Soar, Aerospace Group's New Business Area Investigations, Boeing Computer Services and the Flight Technology Laboratories. He loved his company, his work and his associates.

Ira built models of airplanes and dirigibles as a boy, and during the period 1945 to 1947 and, influenced by his membership in the Boeing "Enginairs" U Control Club, he and a partner formed ZandL Model Products, a local company producing handbuilt balsa wood airplane model kits that were shipped to customers throughout the United States.

In 1949 the Zeasmans broke ground on their dream house, designed and built by them while raising four children: Kathi Hale (Edward), Steve (DeVonne), Barb Clingan (Wes) and Lori Zeasman. All aspects of the house, from clearing the land to mixing the concrete and laying the bricks were accomplished by the pair. The large yard, with a

barbecue pit for hot dog roasts and play areas for basketball and trampoline, was designed for the children's and neighborhood's enjoyment.


Never one to sit still, Ira became interested in boating and built by hand their first small cruiser. A succession of boats led to their final pride and joy, Zeas, that provided so many memories and funfilled hours of cruising with friends and family in the San Juan Islands and Desolation Sound as well as participating in Queen City Yacht Club activities. Retired in March 1982, Ira and Jean enjoyed many trips aboard cruise ships, visiting countless harbors around the world, as well as vacation stops in Hawaii and Palm Springs — always traveling on Boeing jets.

During the last few years Zeas enjoyed lunches with Boeing retiree friends and time spent assembling family genealogy. He was a member of the Boeing Museum of Flight, Queen City Yacht Club and B-47 Stratojet Association. Ira and Jean were married 70 years and she preceded him in death in 2013. Ira is survived by his four children, five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren, who will enjoy recalling all the laughter and family fun when together at home or on camping, boating or airplane trips.


